Seventy years ago, on 26 January 1950, the new Indian constitution was promulgated, and it declared India to be a 'sovereign democratic republic'. The Constituent Assembly, which took a little over three years to draft this document, sought to enshrine in it, certain ideological principles, such as nationalism, democracy and secularism, which had emerged through her anti-colonial struggle. Over the last seven decades, this constitution has been variously interpreted, implemented and amended by different regimes. In recent days, following the passage of the Citizenship Amendment Act 2019, it is once again at the centre of political debates in India. So, it is time to have a look at how the Indian Republic has evolved and has lived up to the visions of the founding fathers.

At a time when New Zealand and the world are seeking to engage with India ever more deeply, it is essential to have a critical look at the current state of the Republic. This conference will offer the opportunity to hear some of the internationally acclaimed experts in the field.
