*This course provides an opportunity for students to complete a Case Study on an approved topic in information management. It is intended that through this process, the student will demonstrate not only mastery of the theoretical basis of the topic chosen, but also an ability to undertake independent research at an appropriate academic level.*

### Course Objectives

Students passing this course should be able to:

1. identify, clarify and investigate a research problem in information management,
2. locate, analyse, and integrate relevant literature,
3. gather and analyse additional data if appropriate, and
4. present a coherent, well-organised argument (written and oral) based on the above.

**Prerequisite:** MIM Core courses and attendance at a workshop on Case Study preparation offered as required.

**Course Dates:** This course may be offered in any trimesters at the discretion of the MIM Programme Director.

\*\* The lecturer will develop a more complete or specific description of the meaning of the various levels of performance based upon the specific nature of the assessment in a course. For example, performance may be determined by the qualities of a written report, a classroom presentation, or work in a group project. The words used to describe these kinds of assessments will obviously vary.

Plagiarism is presenting someone else's work as if it were your own, whether you mean to or not.

*'Someone else's work' means anything that is not your own idea, even if it is presented in your own style. It includes material from books, journals or any other printed source, the work of other students or staff, information from the Internet, software programmes and other electronic material, designs and ideas. It also includes the organization or structuring of any such material.*

### ***Plagiarism is not worth the risk.***

Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct ([www.vuw.ac.nz/policy/studentconduct](http://www.vuw.ac.nz/policy/studentconduct)) and may be penalized severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning
- suspension from class or university
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course.
