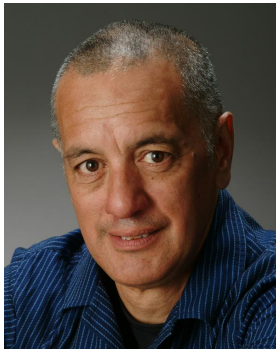

## Course Objectives

By the end of the INFO 530 course, students should:

1. Be familiar with the range of Māori information sources held in libraries throughout Aotearoa
2. Have an appreciation of the use and research value of Māori information sources
3. Have an understanding of the issues associated with Māori information sources, and services to Māori
4. Have the confidence to undertake the collection and management of a range of Māori information resources
5. Be able to confidently deliver a value-added service to Māori enquirers and researchers of Māori issues and subjects

## Course Content

INFO 530 is an interactive course where students are expected to discuss issues raised in the following modules. The modules give samples of Māori research requirements, practices and outcomes. They also highlight the value of particular media and collections that support and enhance Māori research. It is envisaged that the portfolio you create in the second assignment will be an ongoing working tool.

The first two modules describe *whakapapa* as an entity, convention and a research/ educational pedagogy that has allowed Māori /Polynesian communities throughout Moananu-a-Kiwa/Pacific to impose a type of cultural order on existence and the universe. Whakapapa underpins most, if not all, substantive Māori research, and is intended to inform the following ten modules.

The stakeholders of the specialised services, which are described throughout the course, will be identified and their particular requirements amplified. Representatives from some of those stakeholders are being engaged to deliver guest lectures in this course.

### **Late assignments**

Assignments submitted or postmarked after they are due will have a 5% penalty imposed unless an extension has been granted by the course coordinator. Assignments submitted or postmarked more than one week after they are due will not be accepted unless there are exceptional circumstances and the late submission has the prior approval of the course coordinator.

### **Word count**

Each submitted assignment MUST contain a word count, easily available from your word-processing program. The word count should appear under your name. (Note: your name should appear only on the back of the last page of the assignment.) The penalty for not including your word count, or going over the word count, will be 5%.

### **Terms**

Terms are the minimum course requirements that must be satisfied in order to earn the right to be assessed for a final grade. Students in INFO 530 are expected to attend all scheduled sessions. Terms will be granted to students who have:

- attended a minimum of 75% of the scheduled Internet conference or seminar sessions. To be considered in attendance at a Internet conference session, an open learning student must be able to contribute orally to the session using the Internet conferencing software; that is, the student must have a working microphone attached to his or her computer making it possible to respond to questions and to contribute ideas orally.
- completed the two assignments within the allowable time.

### **Academic Integrity and Plagiarism**

Academic integrity is about honesty – put simply it means **no cheating**. All members of the University community are responsible for upholding academic integrity, which means staff and students are expected to behave honestly, fairly and with respect for others at all times.

Plagiarism is a form of cheating which undermines academic integrity. The University defines plagiarism as follows:

*The presentation of the work of another person or other persons as if it were one's own, whether intended or not. This includes published or unpublished work, material on the Internet and the work of other student or staff.*

It is still plagiarism even if you re-structure the material or present it in your own style or words.

*Note: It is however, perfectly acceptable to include the work of others as long as that is acknowledged by appropriate referencing.*

Plagiarism is prohibited at Victoria and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct and may be penalised severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course
- suspension from the course or the University.
