Course Objectives

By the end of this course you should have:

- shown a broad understanding of financial risk management and the financial environment in which risk managers operate.
- shown deep and critical understanding of the selected areas of financial risk management and cognate areas which you have chosen for study.
- exhibited an ability to critically evaluate theoretical and applied literature
- written a clearly drafted report to summarise the main points of the chosen areas of study. You are expected to place those areas in the broader framework of financial risk management, and to evaluate the importance of those areas to financial risk management; to critically evaluate the literature in your chosen areas of study; to comment in depth on possible future developments; and to draw out any similarities and complementarities of your chosen areas of study with other fields.

Course Content

To study in depth a selected area or areas of financial risk management, which areas are to be chosen subject to the approval of the course coordinator; and to write a report on your investigations in those areas.

Readings

There are no specified readings.

Assessment Requirements

The grade is based on an essay, normally of 10,000 to 15,000 words, submitted electronically at the end of the course. There are however two additional requirements.

Within two weeks of enrolment in this course, a short description (a paragraph or two would normally suffice) of the areas of study proposed should be agreed between the student and the coordinator, and an email sent from the coordinator to the student agreeing to the short description which will be enclosed within the email. This initial agreement as to the areas to be studied is able to be modified later, subject to the coordinator's discretion.

Within three months of enrolment in this course, a short summary of progress to date, of about 4 pages, is to be sent to the coordinator by email.

Communication of Additional Information

There will be contact between the student and the coordinator during the tenor of the course, normally every 2 to 4 weeks.

Academic Integrity and Plagiarism

Academic integrity is about honesty – put simply it means **no cheating**. All members of the University community are responsible for upholding academic integrity, which means staff and students are expected to behave honestly, fairly and with respect for others at all times.

Plagiarism is a form of cheating which undermines academic integrity. The University defines plagiarism as follows:

The presentation of the work of another person or other persons as if it were one's own, whether intended or not. This includes published or unpublished work, material on the Internet and the work of other student or staff.

It is still plagiarism even if you re-structure the material or present it in your own style or words.

Note: It is however, perfectly acceptable to include the work of others as long as that is acknowledged by appropriate referencing.

Plagiarism is prohibited at Victoria and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct and may be penalised severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course
- suspension from the course or the University.

Notice of Turnitin Use

Student work provided for assessment in this course may be checked for academic integrity by the electronic search engine <<u>http://www.turnitin.com</u>>. Turnitin is an on-line plagiarism

prevention tool which identifies material that may have been copied from other sources including the Internet, books, journals, periodicals or the work of other students. Turnitin is used to assist academic staff in detecting misreferencing, misquotation, and the inclusion of unattributed material, which may be forms of cheating or plagiarism. At the discretion of the Head of School, handwritten work may be copy typed by the School and subject to checking by Turnitin. You are strongly advised to check with your tutor or the course coordinator if you are uncertain about how to use and cite material from other sources. Turnitin will retain a copy of submitted materials on behalf of the University for detection of future plagiarism, but access to the full text of submissions will not be made available to any other party.
