## **Class Times and Room Numbers**

Lectures will be held on Tuesday in room G01 in Rutherford House from 11:30am-1:30pm. The lecture room is booked for three hours, but each lecture will normally only last two hours.

#### **Course Content**

Material will be drawn from the following list:

- Manager-shareholder conflict
- Capital structure and managers' incentives
- Executive compensation: Symptom or solution?
- Delegating monitoring to the board of directors; large shareholders; banks; and analysts and ratings agencies
- Market for corporate control
- Bondholder-shareholder conflict
- Target levels of debt and dividends
- Adverse selection
- Signalling
- Achieving debt and dividend targets

## **Course Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- demonstrate an understanding of theories of corporate financing and corporate governance based on asymmetric information
- carry out simple empirical tests of these theories, and assess the merits of more complicated empirical tests
- interpret observed firm and market behaviour in terms of these theories
- communicate the key implications of modern corporate finance theories to a non-specialist audience

#### **Course Delivery**

Course delivery takes the form of 12 approximately two-hour lectures.

#### **Expected Workload**

The workload for MOFI 409 is intended to be similar to that for other 400-level ECON and MOFI courses. The total expected workload is 150 hours, comprising 12-13 hours per week.

#### Readings

There is no text. Lecture notes and key readings will be provided.

#### **Materials and Equipment**

Non-programmable calculators will be allowed in the final examination.

#### **Assessment Requirements**

The final grade will be determined by two assignments (each contributing 15%); a referee's report on a specified recent journal article (contributing 10%); a short class presentation of a specified empirical paper (contributing 5%); and a two-hour final exam (contributing 55%).

The relevant due dates are

- Assignment 1: 11:30am on Tuesday, August 18 (start of lecture 6).
- Referee's report: 11:30am on Tuesday, September 29 (start of lecture 10).
- Assignment 2: 11:30am on Tuesday, October 13 (start of lecture 12).

The findings may be used to inform changes aimed at improving the quality of FCA programmes. All material used for such processes will be treated as confidential, and the outcome will not affect your grade for the course.
