Course Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- demonstrate an understanding of theories of corporate financing and corporate governance based on asymmetric information
- carry out simple empirical tests of these theories
- assess the merits of more complicated empirical tests of these theories
- interpret observed firm and market behaviour in terms of these theories
- communicate the key implications of modern corporate finance theories to a non-specialist audience

Course Delivery

Course delivery takes the form of 12 approximately two-hour lectures.

Expected Workload

The workload for MMAF 528 is intended to be similar to that for other 500-level 20 point courses involving weekly lectures. The total expected workload is 200 hours, approximately 16 hours per week.

Readings

There is no text. Lecture notes and key readings will be provided via Blackboard.

Materials and Equipment

Non-programmable calculators will be allowed in the final examination.

Assessment Requirements

The final grade will be determined by two assignments (each contributing 20%) and a two-hour final exam (contributing 60%).
