Course Content

The aim of this course is to provide an understanding of legal principles that impact on business, in particular an understanding of the legal system and of the law relating to civil obligations. The

course is divided into two main parts. The first part provides an introduction to law and an explanation of some key concepts, followed by an introduction to property law (including intellectual property law) and the law of torts (with respect to negligence). The second part deals with that part of the law of civil obligations which relates to the law of contracts.

Course Learning Objectives

At the end of this course, students should be able to understand the functions of the New Zealand legal system:

- (a) Have an understanding of the Treaty of Waitangi and legal issues arising from it;
- (b) Analyse contractual issues;
- (c) Have a general understanding of specific areas of commercial law;
- (d) Analyse legal issues and potential solutions to legal problems;
- (e) Analyse and understand legislation.

Expected Workload

Other readings: Lecture summaries and other handouts will be given out, and made available on Blackboard.

Students are expected to read the readings set for each session in preparation for that session. That will normally be 1-3 chapters from the text (an average of 75 pages). They are also expected to prepare answers to the tutorial questions in order to participate fully in that part of the session.

Assessment Requirements
