## **Course Delivery**

## **Expected Workload**

The workload for ECON 433 is intended to be similar to that for other 400-level ECON or FINA courses. The total expected workload is 150 hours, comprising 12-13 hours per week.

## **Prescription**

This course provides alternative theories of labour markets, models and approaches to supply, demand and pricing of different types of labour.

## **Course Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Understand the principal empirical approaches to estimating key labour-market relationships;
- 2. Use static and inter-temporal labour supply models to explain the supply side of the labour market;
- 3. Understand and apply the productivity and signaling models of human capital theory;
- 4. Explain the presence of group differences in labour market outcomes and understand different ways of empirically measuring discrimination;
- 5. Understand how to measure neighbourhood effects and social interactions and the role of immigration and geographical mobility in the labour market

## **Readings**

You will study and present journal articles and emerging scholarly work. Articles will be provided via Blackboard or available through the library.

## **Materials and Equipment**

Non-programmable calculators or ones with the memory cleared will be allowed in the exam.

## Assessment
