Tax compliance models are used in New Zealand and Australia to promote a co-operative approach to tax administration. Yet, there have been several criticisms of these compliance frameworks and as all the players have vested roles, the transition from theory to actual practice is often different. This talk highlights the intermediary role of tax agents and reports qualitative research on tax knowledge management from the U.K. to highlight the tensions that exist between customer-friendly initiatives and 'traditional' enforcement options under an adversarial system where the prime concern of policymakers is the threat to public revenue.

John Hasseldine is Professor of Accounting and Taxation at University of Nottingham and Co-Director of the University of Nottingham Tax Research Institute. He has worked in the New Zealand Inland Revenue Department as an investigating accountant and at the University of Canterbury as an academic. For the last twenty years, he has been passionate about tax compliance research, working on large projects that involved a change to the status quo. He has close links with HM Revenue & Customs and the National Audit Office in the United Kingdom.
