Here are some tips and tricks you can use to make your research experience at VUW much more productive and enjoyable

Document readability. Have you ever wondered how to test the readability of your writing? Then you probably would be happy to know that there is a feature in Microsoft Word that you can use to see readability statistics for your document. For Microsoft 365: Open your document > Select the Home tab > Choose Editor > Scroll down and go to Document stats. For older versions: Go to File > Options > Proofing > Tick grammar with spelling check box > select Show readability statistics > Return to your document > Select Spelling and Grammar.

'There is no single path' - Konstantina

My PhD journey has not been a linear one. I did a humanities BA and spent some years working full-time in industry before I decided to requalify and focus on cognitive science as a postgrad. It took a lot of hard work to make it to a PhD at Te Herenga Waka - Victoria University of Wellington.

Although coming to New Zealand was a dream come true, it has not been easy. As exciting as it is to explore a new culture, it is not trivial to move across the world – especially as a mature student who has spent quite a bit of time building life back home. And then there was

a global pandemic, plus having a kid mid-way through my PhD...Oh well, I guess PhDs are not meant to be easy anyway!

What has made the experience worthwhile? It is the vast pool of knowledge and expertise within the university — from colleagues and supervisors to professional development workshops, conferences, and opportunities for work and volunteering. If you can tutor or work as a Research Assistant, give it a go and be strategic. If an RA position involves exactly the skills you want to (further) develop, apply even if it is in a different department. Or if a conference like 'ResBaz'

sounds intriguing, why not give it a go even if you have never done any coding or have no programming skills?

What I've learned through past experiences is that transferable skills are really valuable – they are helpful across different fields of study and can take you anywhere. *So, don't be afraid to venture out of your comfort zone.* In fact, my current job in the Research Capability Team at CAD (Center for Academic Development) is directly related to these diverse (and not necessarily related to my PhD) experiences over the years. Working for different companies between my bachelor's degree and postgrad studies has changed my mind set a lot so in addition to intellectual curiosity, I wanted to use my time at the university to actively seek opportunities to grow as a professional.

Initially, I was self-conscious about being one of the few students in my program who did not have a scienceonly background. But in time, it was inspiring to realise that many wonderful researchers (and people in general) around me have followed quite unusual and non-linear paths to get where they are now. There is no such thing as "the right path"; use your PhD to find your own! For some of you, your PhD research topic would become a postdoc, followed by an academic career. Others will want to come back and use their new skills to contribute to their home country. Some might even discover academia is not the right fit for them after all.

Do not worry if your journey is far from a straight line. I have learned to embrace new opportunities, and blend different passions, experiences, and skills instead of seeing them as unrelated distractions. However, make sure you set up your major goals early! Plans almost always change – life is unpredictable. But it is much easier to adapt and respond to change if you keep your eyes on your long-term goals. Whatever the end result is, stay focus on the journey, the people who support you through it, and the skills you can hone along the way.
