Open Access Toolkit

Open access publishing is crucial as it ensures that valuable scholarly knowledge is freely accessible to a global audience, fostering collaboration, innovation, and democratizing information dissemination in the academic community.

Dive into the world of Open Access publishing at the upcoming workshop hosted by the Library. This workshop follows the Library's announcement of new Read & Publish Agreements for 2024 and the official launch of the Open Access toolkit (available under "Publishing OA: Tips and Tricks"/), and aims to give researchers a comprehensive introduction to the world of Open Access publishing. This workshop will explore how Te Herenga Waka-Victoria University of Wellington's Open Access Policy and Read & Publish agreements support researchers to make their work openly accessible. Researchers will be guided through our institutional repository and how to use Elements to deposit their work. Finally, we will discuss the principles of Open Access publishing, including Copyright and Creative Commons licensing, and highlight the value of equity, visibility, and collaboration in making research accessible.

Navigating Storms: A Ph.D. journey through pandemic, parenthood, and perseverance - Rabia



As I set foot on the vibrant shores of New Zealand in March 2020, little did I know that the world was about to face an unprecedented challenge—the COVID-19 pandemic. The excitement of beginning my doctoral journey mingled with the surreal realisation that my PhD would unfold amidst a rapidly evolving global landscape.

The first few months were a blend of academic anticipation and adjusting to a new cultural landscape, all while the pandemic cast its long shadow over our daily lives. Stepping into my Ph.D. journey during these uncertain times meant not only embracing academic expectations but also navigating the joys and responsibilities of caring for my two-month-old baby—a challenge unlike any other.

Working closely with my supervisor, we evaluated initial timelines and milestones, acknowledging the need for a more flexible approach. Remote work strategies became essential, enabling me to conduct literature reviews and data analysis from the comfort of my home, ensuring a steady momentum in my research pursuits.

Amidst the whirlwind of lockdowns triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent closure of international borders, my Ph.D. journey transformed

into an unforeseen and emotionally taxing odyssey. Losing my father, the driving force behind my pursuit of a Ph.D., intensified the struggle, layering grief onto an already challenging situation. One of the most heartwrenching consequences of the pandemic was the impossibility of attending my father's funeral, depriving me of the chance to bid a final farewell to the man who had shaped my academic ambitions.

Every step forward in my Ph.D. journey felt like an uphill climb, every achievement tinged with the bitter realisation that my father's physical presence would never witness my progress again. Yet, there was a silent observer—my baby, the silent witness to my balancing act between research and parenting. Amidst the demands of academia and the complicated dance of research, a true unsung hero emerged—my husband. His unwavering support and selflessness became the bedrock of my Ph.D. journey. From sleepless nights with our newborn to shouldering the weight of household chores, he seamlessly navigated the intricacies of family life, allowing me to focus on my academic pursuits.

The climax of my Ph.D. journey unfolded unexpectedly with a joyous revelation—I found out I was pregnant! Balancing experiments, thesis writing, and pregnancy felt like passing through a storm, presenting a unique set of challenges.

Yet, amidst all these challenges, my supervisor's support was crucial in balancing my academic and personal life. Furthermore, the university's extensive assistance—from student support services to the hardship fund, student learning center, and international services—proved invaluable. These pillars of support not only offered practical aid but also fostered a sense of belonging within the academic community.

As I approached the final stages of my Ph.D., I faced the climax of my efforts with a mix of anticipation and the joys of impending motherhood. The day of my thesis submission arrived, and fate had an extraordinary surprise in store—I welcomed my newborn just after submitting my thesis. With a one-month-old baby beside me, I stood before my Ph.D. committee,

symbolising not only academic achievement but also the resilience and collaboration that defined my journey.

As I continue to reflect on those days, I carry forward not only a doctorate but a rich tapestry of experiences that shaped my approach to challenges and my understanding of the delicate balance between professional aspirations and personal responsibilities. The cap and gown on my graduation day represent not only academic success but also the realization of a dream that transcended generations. This journey was

more than an intellectual pursuit—it was a testament to resilience forged amidst personal loss, parenting challenges, and the emerging shadow of a global pandemic. I did it! And the feeling is indescribably gratifying.

To all of you, I would say: Be prepared to face unique challenges head-on, but also embrace the triumphs that await you!
