Welcome to MUSC 150 - Introduction to World Music

In this course you will survey music from around the world. Each week a new location or cultural group will be studied. You will gain an introduction to the study of traditional musics in Ethnomusicology; and an awareness of the richness and variety of world music, including several that are present in our city and country. You will develop a vision of music, which includes the social and political function of music and the varied theatre, religious, dance and other features, which accompany its performance. You will consider a number of different musics in oral tradition defined by their contribution to community identity.

MATERIALS

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

The course is internally assessed.

1. Reviews - write 3 reviews each of 800 words.

One audio review – Do a review of recorded music using the music data bases at VUW Library or Massey Mt Cook Library = 25 % of final grade.

One workshop review - Do a review of a workshop or practical lesson = 25% of final grade.

One literature review - Do a review of an article handed out in class = 25% of final grade.

2. Written and listening Test.

Examples will be played for description and identification = 25 % of final grade.

Deposit and collection of written work.
