PAPER PRESCRIPTION

A survey of the life and compositions of Alfred Hill (1869-1960) with particular emphasis on the Leipzig years; the early string quartets; career before "retirement"; reception over the last 100 years; the historical significance of his compositions; the current status of his renaissance

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students having taken this paper will

- a. be able to identify a large range of works by Alfred Hill and discuss the compositional devices and influences that make his style unique
- b. be able to elucidate the social context in New Zealand and Australia in which Hill worked in the years 1891-1930 and reflect upon how his music expressed both Maori and Pakeha contemporary culture
- c. be able to draw clear parallels between Hill's compositional style and that of his contemporaries and immediate predecessors in Europe
- d. be able to analyse the structure of any movement of his string quartets, present this in an elucidating format, and demonstrate understanding of the melodic and harmonic language employed
- e. be able to comment on the reception of Hill's music in the 20th and 21st centuries

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Research skills assignment: 15% An annotated bibliography and discography of approximately 1,500 words of sources relevant to an in-depth study of the life and music of Alfred Hill and analysis of selected works. Relates to learning outcomes a-e Useful link http://www.library.cornell.edu/olinuris/ref/research/skill28.htm
- 2. Practical assignment: 25%. Analyses of a first movement and a slow movement of any of the String Quartets Nos 1, 3, 4, 5 or 6, in a format to be advised in lectures. Relates to learning outcome d.
- 3. Major essay: 25%. An essay of approximately 2,500 words entitled "The Influence of European composers on Alfred Hill" with specific examples from a range of works written before 1930, with a summary of the influences that shaped them, the elements that give them uniqueness, and including a bibliographic appendix of works composed before 1930. Relates to learning outcomes a-c
- 4. Minor essay: 15%. An essay of approximately 1,500 words entitled "Reception of Hill's music in New Zealand in the 20th century and its status today" Relates to learning outcomes e.

Class work: 20%. A 15-minute Power Point presentation based on assignment 2, 3 or 4. Relates to the learning outcomes relevant to the chosen topic.

<u>Deadlines for written work:</u>

Written work must be handed in by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, work handed in after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue. Students who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay, must apply to the Paper Co-ordinator before the due date. Please note that NO extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

Bibliographic Style:

Assignments must be presented according to the guidelines set down in the *NZSM Handbook 2006*. - an oral or written warning,
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course,
- suspension from the course or the University.
