PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introduction to the music and dance of the Pacific Islands including examples from the regions of Micronesia, Melanesia and Polynesia.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will be introduced to the distinctive artistic heritage of the Pacific area which combines music dance and text in performance; leading genres from specific areas will be used as examples; the analytical and descriptive literature on the arts of music and dance in the Pacific will be studied.

MATERIALS

You are expected to purchase the Class Anthology for NZSM 251/351. This is available from the student notes shop situated on the ground floor of the Student Union Building, Kelburn. The price of the anthology includes handout notes.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

Assignment 1: Review of an item from the Introductory materials of the course. Following the lecture materials choose a topic or area of interest that has been covered in the first four weeks. Write a short personal essay about your chosen subject based on the materials presented in class and your own research into the subject. You are encouraged to explore and research a region (e.g. Micronesia) or topic (e.g. Dance costume). Due 27 March 800 words worth 15% final grade.

Assignment 2: Fieldwork exercise, explained further in class. Description of a performance (own choice) or exhibition with Pacific content or theme. This description should follow the kinds of analysis and explanation that have been introduced in class. Some of these methods will be more accessible and relevant than others; shape your description to the performance you have chosen, and indicate any areas that need further research. 1000 words, Due Friday 11th April, worth 20% final grade.

Assignment 3: Journal (recording music and dance experiences during the course). This assignment involves keeping a Journal or personal record of several items relevant to the course, describing and reflecting on them. Events should include a range of approximately five different items eg dance performance, choir practice, radio or television program, museum display, book, CD or film. Each should be identified by title/date/place and be described and evaluated in about 200 words. Due 3 June, worth 20% final grade.

Assignment 4: Essay/Seminar . Worth 20% final grade (for 351 students this is a Seminar & Essay. For 251 this is only an essay) 1500 word, Due 29 May A list of Essay topics will be discussed and seminars planned. Seminars will be presented during class hours (see schedule).

Assignment 5: Test on course materials (1 hour in class time, see schedule)
This test at the conclusion of the course involves identifying and commenting on 10 video extracts which have been shown and discussed in class and potentially including content from seminars presented by 351. Date 27 May, 25% final grade.

Plagiarism is prohibited at the NZSM and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct and may be penalized severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning,
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course,
- suspension from the course or the University.
