PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introductory study of diction and language for singers selected from the following range: English, Italian, French and German.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper should be able to demonstrate:

- 1. knowledge of the principles of text analysis, singing diction and the application of IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) to indicate pronunciation in the languages studied
- 2. essential musical terminology in the foreign language(s) studied
- 3. (**in English diction**) the ability to deconstruct a song text, whether in verse or prose, into present-day colloquial English to demonstrate their understanding of the writer's intention

- 4. enough basic grammar to be able, with the aid of a dictionary and/or given translations, to grasp the basic structures and meanings of song texts in the foreign language(s) studied
- 5. the ability to declaim and sing selected song texts with accurate pronunciation

PAPER CONTENT

English diction (Trimester 1: Lecturer Flora Edwards)

- thorough familiarity with phonetic symbols through class discussion and homework exercises
- transposition from English text to IPA and from IPA to English text;
- classification and articulation of consonants; vowel articulation and differentiation; elongation of vowels:
- declamation of text; interpretation of text, sung performance
- critical evaluation of singing in English of recorded artists and performances by student colleagues

German (Trimester 2: Lecturers Anna Dowling and Roger Wilson)

Information about this section will be given out at the start of trimester 2.

MATERIALS

In 2008 there is no class anthology for English diction. Students will be given some handouts but are expected to look online on Blackboard, accessible at http://www.vuuw.ac.nz/MyVictoria for information about the course content covered in class and for notification of assignment material.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

This paper is internally assessed.

For each language studied:

- 1. Portfolio of short written exercises on course content (25%) (learning outcome 1-3)
- 2. Written test (40%) (learning outcomes 1 4).
- 3. Presentation and performance in class of a song (15%) (learning outcomes 1, 4 &5)
- 4. Individual oral test on declamation and performance of one song or aria (20%) (learning outcomes 1 2, 4 & 5).

Deposit and collection of written work

Written assignments must be put in the named pigeon hole of the lecturer. Marked assignments will be returned to the pigeonholes outside the student common room for collection

Dates assignments are due/ dates of in-class tests

- Homework exercises will be given after each class and must be completed by the following week
- Test on written phonetic transcription will be give on Wednesday April 9, at 4-5pm in Rm 209
- Presentation, declamation of own selection song will be heard on Wednesday, May 26 & 28 at 4pm. Your individual time will be allocated in advance at class on Wednesday, May 14

Deadlines for written work:

Written work must be handed in by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, work handed in after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay, must apply to the Paper Co-ordinator <u>before</u> the due date. Please note that NO extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

- an oral or written warning,
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course,
- suspension from the course or the University.
