2 KO NGĀ WHĀINGA ME NGĀ HUA Course Aims, Objectives and Learning Outcomes

MAOR 102 is a course for students with an elementary grasp of oral and written Māori language. The aim of this course is to attain a level of language competency equivalent to NCEA Level 3/Bursary. The course content focuses on developing the following skills in te reo Māori: listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- pronounce te reo Māori accurately
- use ones knowledge of basic structures of Māori to accurately translate short passages, to create new sentences grammatically in both oral and written forms
- recognise, understand and appropriately use a minimum of 200 new words in both oral and written forms, as presented in this course
- recognise, understand and appropriately use a minimum of 50 idiomatic phrases in both oral and written forms, as presented in this course
- understand basic Māori through aural communication.

4 KO NGĀ MAHI

Course Work

Through a combination of the learning opportunities provided in the programme of lectures and tutorials together with noho marae and private study, students will be enabled to meet the course aims, objectives and learning outcomes above.

4.1 Ko Ngā Akoranga Nui Lectures

Lectures are held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10:00am to 11:50am in Murphy Lecture Theatre 101 (MYLT101).

Students must attend a minimum of 14 of the 17 lectures in order to meet the mandatory course requirements (refer 6).

4.2 Ko Ngā Akoranga Whāiti Tutorial Sessions

Tutorial sessions of one hour and fifty minutes are held weekly over 5 weeks starting **week 2**. Tutorials are held on Wednesday, 12:00pm to 1:50pm, and 2:10pm to 4:00pm in von Zedlitz 003.

Students must attend a minimum of 4 tutorials in order to meet the mandatory course requirements (refer 6).

5.3.	1 Essay/Tuhingaroa	10%	

This task assesses your understanding and mastery of the basic structures covered in MAOR 101. You are required to create a piece of writing in te reo Māori, approximately 400 words in length, based on the kaupapa given out in lecture 3 (week 1). The format and guidelines for this task will be explained in detail in lecture 3 (week 1). The completed assignment is due no later than 2pm on Friday 23 January (week 3).

5.3.2 In-class Test 10%

This 50 minute test will assess your understanding of the basic structures covered in the first half of MAOR 102. It will be held during the lecture on **Tuesday, 3 February (week 5)**. The format of this test will be explained in detail in lectures.

5.3.3 Listening Comprehension Tasks

10%

You will be given a sound file each week which can be accessed at the Language Learning Centre (LLC), Level 0, von Zedlitz Building (refer 11 below for further information on the LLC). Your task is to transcribe the sound file, then translate it into English. These tasks are worth 2% each. **No extensions will be granted for these tasks**.

5.3.4 **Waiata** 5%

Students are required to learn and perform the waiata 'Kāore Taku Raru'. This waiata will be practiced in tutorials and lectures. Students will complete a group assessment of the waiata. This assessment will be conducted in **tutorial four (week 5)**.

5.3.5 Unprepared Speech/Korero Ohorere

10%

The unprepared speech will be presented in **tutorial five (week 6)**. You will select a topic in your tutorial on the day and will present a **five minute** speech based on your topic. Further details will be provided in lectures.

5.3.6 **Whakaari** 5%

The whakaari (play) will be presented at the **Hui Rūmaki** (date TBA). This is a group assessment, therefore each student will be assigned to a group in lecture 4 where further details will be provided.

5.3.7 Vocabulary Tests

5%

The vocabulary tests will be held weekly in tutorials beginning **tutorial one** (week 2) and will test you on the weekly vocabulary lists of 50 kupu hou (new words) each week. You must complete all 5 vocabulary tests and attain at least 25/50. Those who do so will receive 0.5% for each test.

5.3.8 Participation and Attendance

5%

This is a summative grade determined by the lecturer and tutor, assessing your competency of te reo in classroom interaction and your active participation in tutorials and lectures.

The final written examination is a two hour closed book examination held during the **Third Trimester Examination Week (16-21 February 2009)**. The date, time and venue will be announced when this information becomes available.

6 KO NGĀ MAHI

Course Requirements

In order to complete this course, students must:

- attend 14 out of 17 lectures
- attend 4 out of 5 tutorial sessions
- attain a minimum of 2.5% for participation and class interaction
- satisfactorily complete all internal assessment tasks
- attempt the Final Examination and
- attain at least 50% when combining internal and exam marks.

Penalties
