Course Aims, Objectives and Content

5. Fa'aaliga/Notices:

6. Course Aims & Objectives:

The study of the Samoan language can give an insight into Samoan thought and culture, and the material read during the course sheds light on Samoan society. The main focus of this course will be on speaking, reading, writing with emphasis on speaking Samoan. This will be at an extremely simple level at first, but by the time students complete the subsequent language course 101 they will have read and should be able, with a dictionary to understand the Samoan language.

This course has two main objectives, and each is of equal importance. Students who pass the course should:

- * have a basic understanding and appreciation of the Samoan language, and some experience of reading Samoan.
- * have the necessary level of competence to take (SAMO 102) in the second half year.

7. <u>TUTORIALS:</u>

You are required to attend 4 hours of tutorial per week. The minimum attendance for the trimester in order to satisfy course requirements is <u>8 tutorials</u>. Tutorial times will be sorted out on Monday, 17 November. Tutorials will start on week 1, on Tuesday 18, November, from 11am-12pm.

8. <u>LANGUAGE LABS:</u>

4 hour per week of language laboratory is required of each student. The minimum attendance for the trimester in order to satisfy course requirements is <u>8 language labs</u>. Classes will be sorted out by Monday 17, November. Lab classes start on Tuesday 18, November, at 1-2pm.

12. (a) <u>Oral Exercises</u> - 30%

Two oral exercises are required. The first one is an <u>oral examination worth 15%</u>. This will take place during Mafutaga, <u>22 November</u>, <u>2008</u>. The second one is an <u>oral comprehension</u>. This will take place on <u>Thursday 27 November</u>, <u>2008</u>. This is worth <u>15%</u>. Requirements for both exercises will be announced in class well before time.

13. <u>Mafutaga Nonofo Fa'atasi / Weekend Language Camp / 25%</u>

All students in Samoan 101 are required to spend one day on a weekend at a Language camp or Mafutaga. The weekend provides opportunities to gain insight into some of the customs and practices associated with a Samoan environment. Oral skills will receive a major focus during this weekend.

Failure to do so will result in denial to terms. Any student who cannot attend will need to bring a letter from the appropriate authority or a medical

certificate from the doctor whichever is appropriate. A major assignment of 1500 words will be required from students who cannot attend for a very good reason.

Academic integrity and plagiarism

Academic integrity is about honesty – put simply it means *no cheating*. All members of the University community are responsible for upholding academic integrity, which means staff and students are expected to behave honestly, fairly and with respect for others at all times.

Plagiarism is a form of cheating which undermines academic integrity. The University defines plagiarism as follows:

The presentation of the work of another person or other persons as if it were one's own, whether intended or not. This includes published or unpublished work, material on the Internet and the work of other students or staff.

It is still plagiarism even if you re-structure the material or present it in your own style or words.

Note: It is however, perfectly acceptable to include the work of others as long as that is acknowledged by appropriate referencing

Plagiarism is prohibited at Victoria and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct and may be penalized severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning,
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course,
- suspension from the course or the University.
