A Very Good to Superior

- Meets or exceeds all the objectives of the assignment.
- persuasive; ambitious in its goals, presents complex ideas in an interesting manner. Content is sophisticated, thorough, and well suited for the audience; original, substantive,
- Style is clear, accurate, concise and forceful.
- Organisation and format make the information accessible, and attractive
- Mechanics and grammar are correct.

B Competent to Good

- organisation. Meets the objectives of the assignment, but may need improvement on style or
- format, or content. Is generally well written but may contain minor errors or inconsistencies in grammar,
- Content is well expressed but not fully developed. No major flaws
- the information may be inadequate for the intended audience. May be well organised and clearly written, but reasoning may be routine or self-evident, or

C Acceptable

- Misses some important objectives.
- Needs significant improvement in concept, detail, development, organisation, grammar,
- contain numerous or major grammatical and stylistic errors. May be formally correct but superficial in content, or may be adequate in content but
- content beyond opinion or description. Fulfils basic requirements but offers little of genuine importance; lacks in intellectual

Fail Grades (D – E) - Unacceptable

- Misses most or all objectives
- several major errors. Has scant information, does something other than the assignment requires, or contains
- Contains seriously inappropriate style or content for the intended audience
- Assignment has been penalized for unacceptably late submission, or for plagiarized
