# 5. COURSE CONTENT AND LEARNING OBJECTIVES

FREN 215 aims to develop and refine skills in formal written expression (dissertation), oral expression (exposé), aural and written comprehension and grammar through the study of three different themes. Students who pass the course will have a clear understanding of the rules of the French dissertation and will be able to produce well-structured, well-written texts. They will have refined their listening skills through

regular work with the audio-visual material available in the Language Learning Centre and through the linguistic and thematic analysis of three different films in class. They will also be able to participate in informal and semi-formal discussions and debates in French on topics covered in the course.

The Tuesday lecture of each week will focus on the tools needed for improving formal writing skills and will also address specific grammar points. The Thursday lecture will help students improve aural comprehension through the linguistic and thematic analysis of three different films. During the two weekly tutorials, students will have the opportunity to develop formal and informal oral expression, as well as reading and listening skills.

### 7. ASSESSMENT

The course is entirely internally assessed (See *Important Dates*, p.4). Assignments, oral group presentations, continuous written assessments and tests are designed to encourage students to work regularly (in class and on their own) to ensure that grammar, vocabulary, idioms and culture are assimilated as the course progresses, and to provide students with regular feedback. The course assessment consists of:

1 Dissertation (assignment)	20%
2 Tests: Test 1 Written comprehension	15%
Test 2 Oral comprehension	15%
1 Exposé	15%
1 Projet ciné (assignment)	15%
1 Oral group presentation	10%
1 continuous written assessment (exercises)	10%

**NOTE:** Exposés and oral group presentations will be conducted during tutorial times. Tests 1 and 2 will be conducted during lecture times. Assignments are completed by students in their own time.

# All assignments must include a cover sheet available from SLC Reception.

Assignments are to be dropped in to the French assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Reception area on the 6<sup>th</sup> floor of yon Zedlitz.

# RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN OBJECTIVES AND ASSESSMENT

The dissertation, Test 1 and the continuous written assessment are designed to assess written expression and comprehension while the *projet ciné* and Test 2 prioritise listening and comprehension skills. The oral group presentation, the *exposé* and oral comprehension test oral skills. Assessment thus reflects the four main aspects of language learning which are crucial to the objectives of the course.

# 8. PENALTIES

Any problem regarding deadlines should be discussed in advance with the Course Coordinator.

Assignments must be submitted by the due date (see *Important Dates*, p.4 in this course outline). Extensions for assignments should be requested from the Course Coordinator as early as possible before the deadline. Late work may be accepted to complete the requirements of the course but may be assigned a zero mark if no prior arrangement is made.

- Students who are unable to sit their exposé or their oral group presentation due to extraordinary circumstances must contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible. Arrangements may be made for students to do a replacement exposé or oral group presentation on presentation of a medical certificate or appropriate document(s). If the Course Coordinator has not been contacted before or at the latest the day after exposé or oral group presentation date, no replacement exposé or oral group presentation will be offered and the missed assessment work will be assigned a zero mark.
- **Tests** should be sat at the scheduled time (see *Important Dates*, p.4). For students who are unable to sit a test due to extraordinary circumstances such as health problems or a family bereavement, alternative arrangements may be agreed to by the Course Coordinator, on presentation of a medical certificate or other appropriate document(s). Such arrangements must be made <u>as soon as possible</u>, at the latest the day after the test date. If the Course Coordinator has not been contacted by that day, a fail grade may be awarded.

# 9. EXPECTED WORKLOAD

In line with Faculty workload guidelines, students are expected to devote 15 hours per week on average to a course of this level: i.e. 11 hours of individual study on top of the 4 hours of class-work.

As part of the independent self-learning component of the course, students need to make regular use of the resources in the LLC to work on their particular learning needs and to self-monitor their learning. Students are also responsible for acquiring vocabulary, idioms and grammar as they are taught. Daily independent learning is necessary.

Students are expected to watch the three studied films listed in section 5 during their own time.

#### 10. MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Full class attendance is expected. Attendance at a minimum of 80% of classes (both lectures and tutorials) and completion of ALL assignments, oral exams and tests as scheduled [see *Important Dates*, p.4] are required. Students who have not fulfilled the mandatory requirements will fail the course or may be awarded a K grade (if they obtained more than 50%).

# 11. ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND PLAGIARISM

Academic integrity means that university staff and students, in their teaching and learning are expected to treat others honestly, fairly and with respect at all times. It is not acceptable to mistreat academic, intellectual or creative work that has been done by other people by representing it as your own original work.

Academic integrity is important because it is the core value on which the University's learning, teaching and research activities are based. Victoria University's reputation for academic integrity adds value to your qualification.
