PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introductory study of diction and language for singers selected from the following range: English diction, Italian, French, and German.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper should be able to demonstrate knowledge of

- 1. the principles of text analysis, singing diction and the application of IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) to indicate pronunciation in the languages studied
- 2. essential musical terminology in the foreign language(s) studied
- 3. enough basic grammar to be able, with the aid of a dictionary and/or given translations, to grasp the basic structures and meanings of song texts in the foreign language(s) studied to be able to declaim and sing selected song texts with clear and accurate pronunciation

PAPER CONTENT

The course will be taught in 2 modules: Italian in the 1st trimester and French in the 2nd trimester.

Italian:

As outlined in the attached syllabus, the course will cover the rules for the pronunciation of Italian on the basis of spelling, ipa transcription of Italian, basic grammar as it relates to the translation of Italian texts from the repertoire. This will be reinforced by time spent in the 'language lab' at the Language Learning Centre, where students will work individually on listening and pronunciation exercises and related activities.

MATERIALS

You will need to purchase the following required texts for the Italian module of the course:

- Course Handbook For Italian (available at Student Notes, Ground Floor, Student Union building, Kelburn)
- BBC 'Italian Grammar' new edition 2006 (available at Vic Books, Student Union Bldg, Kelburn)
- Bantam New College Italian/English Dictionary (available at Vic Books, Student Union Bldg, Kelburn)

Texts required for the French module will be notified closer to the time

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

This paper is internally assessed.

For each language studied:

- 1. Portfolio of 5 short written and recorded exercises on course content (15%) (learning outcomes 1-3)
- 2. One written test (35%) (Learning outcomes 1 3).
- 3. Presentation and performance in class of a song (15%) (learning outcomes 1, 3)
- 4. Individual oral test including the declamation and performance of one song or aria (35%) (learning outcomes 1, 3).

Deposit and collection of written work

Italian: any assignments handed in outside of class time should be marked to attention of the relevant tutor and handed in at the NZSM reception, Kelburn

Dates assignments are due/ dates of in-class tests

Italian assessment dates:

- the 5 written and recorded exercises will be assigned in class and will be due at the beginning of the Monday class time
- presentation of a song in allotted tutorial times: between 6th April and 25th May
- 1st June, individual oral tests (approx 10 mins per student)
- 3rd June, final written test on pronunciation rules, ipa, grammar (50 mins)

Deadlines for written work:

Written work must be handed in by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, work handed in after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay, must apply to the Paper Co-ordinator <u>before</u> the due date. Please note that NO extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

Bibliographic Style:

Assignments must be presented according to the guidelines set down in the **NZSM Handbook 2009**. A fuller version entitled **NZSM Guidelines for Academic Work**, can be downloaded as a pdf file from the NZSM Website http://www.nzsm.ac.nz/Study/Programmes of Study page. Five percent (5%) will be deducted for written work that does not conform.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

Completing all the assessment items and attending at least 80% of your lectures and tutorials are a mandatory requirement for this paper. If for health reasons you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes by 27 October you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director of the New Zealand School of Music.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY AND PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is prohibited at the NZSM and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct and may be penalized severely. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning.
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course,
- · suspension from the course or the University.
