PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Development of knowledge and technical ability on the student's selected instrument to an advanced standard and on piano to an intermediate standard through individual lessons, workshops and self-directed learning.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of this paper the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate performer techniques and perform as a competent ensemble musician and as a soloist to an advanced standard
- 2. Demonstrate memorisation of specified tunes from the second year repertoire (melody and chords)
- 3. Transcribe and perform prescribed solos
- 4. Recognise and play on the keyboard; common chords, common chord progressions and simple melodies.
- 5. Demonstrate competency on percussion in Afro-Cuban and Brazilian musical contexts and percussion ensembles (drummers only).

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 30-point full-year performance paper should requre at least 300 hours work. This means that in term time, the midterm breaks and study weeks you should be prepared to spend an average of at least 8 hours a week attending lessons, classes, workshops or rehearsals as appropriate, and practising.

PAPER CONTENT

Individual weekly lessons covering technique and jazz style, reading and scale knowledge. Weekly performance workshops involving opportunities to engage in performance and criticism.

MATERIALS

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

This Paper is 100% internally assessed.

The weightings for assessment are:

- 1. Final examination (drummers) 90%
- 2. Final examination (all other instrumentalists and singers) 100%
- 5. Keyboard Proficiency (except pianists) 0%
- 6. Percussion Workshop (drummers only) 10%

The assessment varies according to specialisation so that all appropriate learning outcomes are addressed (refer to assessment schedules).

Students must satisfactorily complete all required components, attend performance workshop, perform in performance workshop 6 times (three times each trimester), and achieve above 50% for their final recital. Note that in order to progress to PERF 320, a B- grade or better is required in this paper.

The final examination schedule will be posted mid-way through Trimester 2.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

Completing all the assessment items and attending at least 80% of your lessons and workshops are mandatory requirements for this paper. If for health reasons you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes for this Paper by 27 October, you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director, NZSM. Students must perform an improvised solo three times per trimester in order to pass.
