PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Further development of knowledge and application of technical skills to perform extended jazz repertoire on the student's primary instrument to a professional level

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the paper the student should be able to:

- 1. Recognise and improvise in the various idioms of contemporary jazz.
- 2. Analyse a harmonic chord progression and demonstrate the ability to apply good voice leading, upper structures, scale tension and substitution (not applicable to drummers).
- 3. Apply advanced rhythmic and melodic techniques in an improvisation (not applicable to drummers).
- 4. Improvise on the drumset solos in different lengths, from 4's, 8's, 12's and 32 bars over a vamp, open solo, or with different backing figures in any style (drummers only).

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 40-point full-year performance paper should require at least 480 hours work. This means that in term time, the midterm breaks and study weeks you should be prepared to spend an average of at least 16 hours a week attending lessons, classes, workshops or rehearsals as appropriate, and practising.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

This paper is 100% internally assessed. There are four items of assessment.

- 1. Two practical improvisation assessments during the year (one at the end of each semester) @ 20% each 40% of final grade.
- 2. Notation and performance of 3 transcriptions 10%
- 3. Final Examination 50%

Item 1 relates to learning outcomes 1,2 and 3 (instrumentalists and vocalists only) and 1 and 4 (drummers only).

Item 2 relates to learning outcome 1 and 2.

Item 3 relates to learning outcomes 1, 2 3 and 4.

Students must pass all assignments and achieve a pass mark in the final examination to achieve a pass grade in this course.

The final examination schedule will be posted mid-way through Trimester 2.

DATES ASSIGNMENTS ARE DUE

These will be distributed to students in class on the first day of the semester.

DEPOSIT AND COLLECTION OF WRITTEN WORK

All written work must be handed to the lecturer on the due date. It may be collected from the lecturer or from the NZSM office, Mt Cook Campus.

DEADLINES FOR WRITTEN WORK

Written work must be handed in by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, work handed in after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay, must apply to the Paper Co-ordinator before the due date.
