PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Development of theoretical knowledge and skills for improvisation, composition, transcription, transposition and analysis to an advanced standard.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the paper students will:

- 1. Understand the importance and use of jazz chord structures and voicings
- 2. Understand the importance and use of functional harmony and harmonisation
- 3. Understand the importance and use of reharmonisation in the jazz idiom.
- 4. Understand the importance and use of harmonic analysis
- 5. Understand the structure and function of extended and altered chords and their related scales.
- 6. Understand the importance and use of synthetic and exotic scales.
- 7. Understand the importance and use of melodic analysis
- 8. Understand the importance and use of rhythmic analysis
- 9. Identify and transcribe compound intervals, inverted 7th, 9th, 11th, and 13th chords.
- 10. Sight sing melodies
- 11. Identify and transcribe melodies, rhythmic phrases, patterns and common chord progressions.
- 12. Identify, transcribe and sing scales covered in Jazz Theory 1 and 2.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 20-point second trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 16 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

PAPER CONTENT

Revision of Jazz Theory 1, Quartal and "So What" Voicings, Advanced Voicings, Harmonisation, Functional Harmony, Harmonic Analysis, Synthetic and Exotic Scales, Advanced Nomenclature, Polychords, Upper Structures, Melodic Analysis, Rhythmic Analysis, Reharmonisation.

COURSE DELIVERY

The course will consist of two 2 hour lectures per week.

Tutorials will be offered if considered appropriate by the lecturer. Attendance at these will be optional. Time and location will be announced during class sessions.

You are expected to purchase the workbook entitled Music 264 Jazz Theory 2 Workbook; see lecturer for details at the commencement of classes.
