Course content

BRAZ 111 is a first trimester 20-point beginner course for students in the Brazilian-Portuguese language. The course provides an introduction to pronunciation, basic grammar, reading, simple composition and conversation.

Learning objectives

Upon completing the course successfully, students will be able to:

- (i) understand simple spoken Portuguese;
- (ii) relate Portuguese sounds to their written forms;
- (iii) pronounce a simple Portuguese text accurately;
- (iv) demonstrate a knowledge of basic Portuguese grammar;
- (v) write simple sentences about themselves, using present, future, and past tenses and employing a basic vocabulary;
- (vi) demonstrate knowledge of the Brazilian-Portuguese language appropriate to a variety of everyday situations.

Expected workload

The Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty Committee on Workloads and Assessment has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 100-level one trimester 20-point course *should work on average 13 hours per week*, including the 3 contact hours - i.e., in the case of BRAZ 111, *10 hours of private study outside class time*.

Assessment requirements

Assessment for BRAZ 111 is, as follows:

- (i) First Written Test: 20% Due date: 22nd April
- (ii) Second Written Test: 20% Due date: 27th May

- (iii) First Composition (length of approximately 100 words): 10% Due date: 1st April;
- (iv) Second Composition (length of approximately 150 words): 10% Due date: 18th May;
- Individual Oral Test: 10% Due date: From 1st June to 4th June. A list of time slots will be posted on the BRAZ 111 noticeboard for students to choose a time convenient for them;
- (vii) Final Exam: 30% Due date: The final examination will be held during the examination period, 11 June to 4 July 1010.

Relation of Assessment to Objectives

The written tests and the two compositions relate to objectives (iv), (v) and (vi) and the individual oral test and exercises relate to objectives (i), (ii) and (iii), as specified in Section "Learning Objectives".

Penalties

The due date for the assignments given in the Course Programme <u>must</u> be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due date if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a <u>5% deduction per day</u>. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments (see section below).

Mandatory course requirements

In order to pass BRAZ 111, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- (i) attend a minimum of <u>80%</u> of the audio-visual classes;
- (ii) attend a minimum of <u>80%</u> of the tutorials;
- (iii) submit the 2 written assignments (compositions) by the date indicated;
- (iv) complete the two written tests on the schedule date;
- (v) complete the individual oral test at the appointed time;
- (vi) complete the final exam on the scheduled date.

In order to pass BRAZ 111 a student must meet the mandatory course requirements and achieve at least an average of a "C" over all the assessment.

Presentation of Assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. The compositions may be typed. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write double space. The compositions must include a cover sheet available from the SLC Reception. Assignments are to be handed in to Brazilian assignment box located at SLC Reception area on the 6^{th} floor of von Zedlitz.

Statement on legibility

Students are expected to write clearly. Where work is deemed 'illegible', the options are:

- the student will be given a photocopy of the work and asked to transcribe it to an acceptable standard (preferably typed) within a specified time frame after which penalties will apply;
- the student will be given a photocopy of the work and asked to transcribe it to an acceptable standard (preferably typed) and lateness penalties apply;
- if the student does not transcribe it to an acceptable standard, the work will be accepted as 'received' (so any associated mandatory course requirements are met) but not marked.

Language Learning Centre (LLC)

Students are encouraged to make use of the audio-visual material available at the LLC to practice their language skills.

Class Representative

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students.

Academic Integrity and Plagiarism

Academic integrity means that university staff and students, in their teaching and learning are expected to treat others honestly, fairly and with respect at all times. It is not acceptable to mistreat academic, intellectual or creative work that has been done by other people by representing it as your own original work.

- Designs and ideas
- The organisation or structuring of any such material
