## **Course delivery**

Students will practice the four skills of reading, writing, speaking, and listening in the lectures and further grammatical structures will be introduced. In the tutorials, further practice will be given for speaking and writing Japanese. A Japanese film will also be viewed in the tutorials and scripts from the film will be examined, providing students with an opportunity to appreciate some aspects of Japanese popular culture.

## **Learning objectives**

This course is a continuation of the work done in JAPA 202. It is intended to bring students to an intermediate level in Japanese where they will be able to converse fluently and express their opinions about matters of a general nature, both orally and in writing. Students will learn about Japanese society and its people through language study, so they will have a more profound understanding of Japan and are able to communicate with Japanese people on various topics. By the end of this course students will understand approximately 750 kanji and their ability in the language should have reached the equivalent of the Japanese Proficiency Test level 3 under the new 5 tier system (level 2 under the old 4 tier system).

## **Expected workload**

The Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty Committee on Workloads and Assessment has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 200-level one trimester 20-point course should work on average 13 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of JAPA203, 8 hours of private study outside class time.

a) Students are required to attend 5 hours of tuition per week. A minimum of 80% of all classes including tutorials must be attended.

<sup>\*</sup>There will be no tutorials in the first week of term.

- b) Only the class/tutorial a student is enrolled in may be attended. If a student finds he/she can no longer attend a class/tutorial time due to a change in personal circumstances, he/she must consult with the course coordinator and submit a Change of Course form when appropriate.
- c) Students must submit all assignments; sit all tests (except kanji quizzes); and take part in performing a drama in tutorials.
- d) The university guideline for the average number of study hours per week including class contact hours for a 200 level full year 20 points course is 15 hours per week (five hours in class and ten hours work in your own time).
- e) If a student's progress is not satisfactory despite spending a large amount of time on study, the Course Coordinator should be consulted. Students should feel free to consult the Coordinator at any time with any queries.

## **Assessment requirements**

This course is internally assessed and each student's progress will be assessed by assignments and progress tests, and other tests during the course.

#### Assessment details:

1. Short Tests 20%

Kanji quizzes  $5 \times 2\% = 10\%$ Vocab quizzes  $5 \times 2\% = 10\%$ 

There will be 6 quizzes each to test kanji and vocab. Only the marks of students' 5 best quizzes will be counted toward their final mark.

2. Written assignments 2 x 5%
Refer to Schedule regarding deadlines. The written assignments are designed to assess students' ability to write compositions in Japanese in a culturally appropriate and logical fashion. (500-700 letters).

3. <u>5 minute drama in pairs (17 September)</u> 10%Detailed information will be given in lectures.

4. Oral test (12 October)

Detailed information will be given in lectures.

5. Progress tests (20 August & 15 October) 2 x 25%

The progress tests are written tests that assess students' retention of the grammar learnt and their ability in writing, translating and listening skills

### **Penalties**

- a) If you are unable to sit a test due to extraordinary circumstances such as a family bereavement (supported by a letter explaining the circumstances) or health problems (supported by a medical certificate), the course coordinator must be contacted prior to the time of assessment.
- b) If you miss a test without giving prior warning, the mark of this test will be nil.
- c) If you are unable to submit your assignment by the due date, you must contact the course coordinator before that date and if there is a medical reason, a medical certificate must be provided. The deadline for an assignment will be notified in the assignment paper or in class.
- d) If you fail to submit your assignment by the due date without giving prior warning, the mark of this assignment will be nil. Late submissions (that have been notified to the course coordinator prior to the deadline) may incur penalty marks being deducted.

### **Mandatory course requirements**

To gain a pass in this course each student must:

- a) Attend at least 80% of all lectures and tutorials.
- b) Sit all the tests except kanji guizzes.
- c) Submit all assignments by their due dates.
- d) Play a part in a drama in the class

### **Class Representative**

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students.
