PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Jazz Improvisation develops competence in improvising over chord progressions and explores principles of improvisation; Combo develops students' understanding of ensemble playing and the roles of their instrument in performance situations; and Performance Workshop builds skills in fundamental areas of performance and performance analysis.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will:

- 1. Demonstrate awareness of the basic principles of improvisation
- 2. Appreciate the contribution of other factors which affect the improvisation process.
- 3. Demonstrate elementary skills in jazz feel and interpretation
- 4. Play tunes from the foundation repertoire with an ensemble.
- 5. Demonstrate an awareness of both individual and group dynamics and rhythm.
- 6. Demonstrate the role(s) of their instrument in a specific combo setting.
- 7. Demonstrate a basic awareness of other roles in the combo.
- 8. Accept criticism of own performance
- 9. Make relevant critical comments of performance by other students
- 10. Demonstrate developing skill in appraisal and evaluation of performance

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 15-point second-trimester paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 12 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

This course comprises 1 one hour Lecture/Workshop and 2 one hour workshops per week.
