Course delivery

This course is delivered through two lectures, one tutorial and one audiovisual class per week. The lectures will mainly cover grammatical aspects of the Spanish language and the development of written skills, such as written comprehension, translation of short and simple texts, and development of advanced written expression in general. The tutorials will focus on the development of oral linguistic skills and the audiovisual classes will aim to develop listening comprehension skills. Both the tutorials and the audiovisual classes will require students' active participation in group exercises or activities.

Communication of additional information

The Spanish noticeboard is in the corridor outside the Spanish Seminar Room (VZ 515). Additional information or information on changes will be conveyed to students either via class, noticeboards, Blackboard, or email.

Course content

SPAN 316 aims to further develop the skills acquired in SPAN 315, making particular use of authentic materials from Spanish-speaking countries in both aural and printed form. Additional emphasis will be placed on the active use of both spoken and written Spanish.

Learning objectives

SPAN 316 is a second-trimester 20-point practical course in Spanish Language for advanced-level students. The aim of the course is to further develop students' competence in both spoken and written Spanish to an advanced level. The teaching of the language is reinforced through written exercises, reading comprehension, oral and aural activities and set assignments. Emphasis is placed on improving students' ability to communicate in a variety of language registers, using a wide range of vocabulary from both Spain and Latin American countries.

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- i. read and comprehend a variety of texts in Spanish;
- ii. understand Spanish spoken at reasonable speed by native speakers of both Peninsular and Latin American Spanish;
- iii. express ideas in both spoken and written Spanish on a wide range of topical issues with reasonable accuracy and fluency;
- iv. demonstrate a command of a wide range of vocabulary and grammatical structures;
- v. accurately translate short texts into English and into Spanish.

Expected workload

The Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty Committee on Workloads and Assessment has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 300-level one-trimester 20-point course should work on average 13 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of SPAN 316, 9 hours of private study outside class time.

Readings

Essential texts: The prescribed text for SPAN 316 is *Es Español 3 Nivel Avanzado*, available from the VicBooks, Student Union Building. Both the student's text and the accompanying grammar workbook will be used in the course.

After week two all undergraduate textbooks will be sold from VicBooks and student notes from the Student Notes Distribution Centre on the ground floor of the Student Union Building.

Assessment requirements

Assessment for SPAN 316 is by in-term assessment and final examination, as follows: 1 assignment (10%); 1 written test (20%); 1 audiovisual test (10%); final oral test (15%) and final 3-hour written examination (45%). The relevant dates for the pieces of assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme.

The written assignment and final exam measure students' competency in objectives (i), (iii), (iv) and (v). The listening test relates to objectives (ii) and (iv) and the oral test relates to objectives (ii), (iii) and (iv).

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Co-ordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day.

Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after 22 October.

Mandatory course requirements

In order to pass SPAN 316, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- i. complete the assignment by the due date;
- ii. sit the written test on the date indicated;
- iii. attend the oral test at the appointed time;
- iv. attend the written examination at the appointed time.

Presentation of assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines (double space if typing). Do not write in pencil. Please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments. All assignments must include a cover sheet available from SLC Reception. Assignments are to be handed in to the Spanish assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Reception area on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz.

Student representatives

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students.

Student club, student facilities

All students of Spanish are encouraged to join the students' Spanish Club and to participate in the social and cultural events organised. A noticeboard for the Spanish Students' Club is in the Spanish library (VZ606). Spanish newspapers and magazines are available in the Spanish library and may be taken away, but should be signed for in the book, which is in the library. Please note that this room will also be used for Honours classes so please check timetable on door.
