# **Course delivery**

This course is taught via a seminar format in which the lecturer assists in explaining Latin grammar, vocabulary and translation; students participate fully in all activities such as explanation and learning, as well as reading and translating sentences and passages.

## Communication of additional information

# **Learning objectives**

The aims of this course are to build on LATI 104 and thereby to increase:

- (i) understanding of the Latin language
- (ii) fluency in the reading of Latin
- (iii) knowledge and critical appreciation of Latin literature

Students who pass this integrated course of Latin language and literature will have improved their abilities to understand and to read Latin more easily and to appreciate Latin literature. Both students and lecturer will be able to evaluate progress in realising these objectives via the assessment exercises listed below.

#### **Penalties**

All in-term tests must be taken on the day set, unless there are medical or other demonstrable extenuating circumstances. Variances will be considered upon application—preferably before the event.

## Workload

Students are recommended to spend a minumum, on average, of 12–14 hours per week on this course, allowing for a higher workload in the week leading up to a quiz or test, and allowing also for revision in the mid-trimester break. The assessments and non-assessed exercises are designed to allow both student and lecturer to evaluate the student's progress in accomplishing the objectives of the course. Assessment is designed to help the student and the lecturer evaluate progress in three key areas, as well as to provide a final grade:

- memorisation of vocabulary and grammatical points.
- understanding of how vocabulary and grammar are used, tested by the translation of simple sentences of Latin to English or English to Latin.
- application of the student's knowledge by translating longer passages from Latin to English.

# Mandatory course requirements

This course is 100% internally assessed. There are no mandatory course requirements. It is highly unlikely, however, that any student will complete the course satisfactorily without attending and fully participating in at least 80% of all classes and attempting all work set.
