PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introduction to the procedures of tonal music, including diatonic harmony, species counterpoint, melodic and rhythmic dictation, aural perception, and keyboard skills.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will:

- 1. Demonstrate an ability to write four-part diatonic harmony with fluency
- 2. Demonstrate an ability to write two-voice counterpoint with fluency
- 3. Demonstrate supporting aural skills
- 4. Demonstrate supporting keyboard skills.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 20-point first-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

This course comprises three 1-hour lectures per week and one 1-hour Musicianship Laboratory per week. During Musicianship Laboratories a graduate tutor will guide students and give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate.
