PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An examination, made through creative and/or critical work, of practices in sonic art and instrumental/vocal composition that understand and utilise sound, time and space in ways that depart from traditional models for the creation, performance and reception of sound and music.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper will:

1. understand the key creative concepts/techniques applicable to the sonic and musical contexts outlined in the paper prescription
2. understand and apply the key theoretical and critical concepts appropriate to the sonic and musical contexts outlined in the paper prescription
3. understand and apply the key analytical techniques appropriate to the sonic and musical contexts outlined in the paper prescription
4. understand the core literature and repertoire in this field
5. have proposed and created or interpreted/analysed work(s) appropriate to the sonic/musical context outlined in the paper prescription.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 20-point first-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

This course comprises two 1.5-hour lectures per week, which will include critical listening and discussion. Students are expected to contribute to discussion around lecture topics, as well as to discuss their scholarly and/or creative work in class. A key aspect of the course is the development of skills in interdisciplinary research. Therefore, students are expected to bring their own specific background and expertise to bear upon their own work and in-class discussion, as well as to come to terms with critical and creative ideas that are new to them.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are five items of assessment:

1. Critical journal (10 entries, approx. 1,500 words), 20%; Related to learning outcomes 1-4
2. Analysis assignment (max. 1,000 words with analytical diagrams), 20%; Related to learning outcomes 2 and 3
3. Literature/repertoire review (max. 1,000 words), 15%; Related to learning outcome 4
4. Project or essay proposal (max. 1,000 words), 15%; Related to learning outcome 5
5. Creative project (dur. 8 mins or equivalent) or essay (max. 2,500 words), 30%; Related to learning outcomes 1-5.

Deposit and collection of written work

Written assignments should be deposited electronically via Blackboard as either Word or Open Office documents. Creative work must be submitted physically (printed scores, CD, DVD, etc.) to Dugal McKinnon's staff box in the NZSM (Kelburn) foyer.

Marked assignments will be returned via Blackboard, and assignment materials will be returned to the student boxes at the NZSM (Kelburn).

NB: All students are requested to retain all assessment, as this may be required at the end of the course.

Deadlines for written and creative work:

Written work must be handed in by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, work handed in after 5:00pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay or creative project,

must apply to the paper co-ordinator before the due date. Please note that NO extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

The following mandatory requirements for this paper have been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

To gain a pass in this course each student must:

- a) Complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work).
- b) Attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course.
- c) Attend at least one Music Forum seminar presentation in the term the course is taught.

If, for health reasons, you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes for this paper by 2 July, you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director, NZSM.
