PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introductory study of diction and language for singers selected from the following range: English diction, Italian, French, and German.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper should be able to demonstrate knowledge of

1. the principles of text analysis, singing diction and the application of IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) to indicate pronunciation in the languages studied
2. essential musical terminology in the foreign language(s) studied
3. enough basic grammar to be able, with the aid of a dictionary and/or given translations, to grasp the basic structures and meanings of song texts in the foreign language(s) studied to be able to declaim and sing selected song texts with clear and accurate pronunciation

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 10-point full-year paper should require at least 100 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time and the midterm breaks you should be prepared to spend on average 4 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

In 2011, the languages studied will be Italian and French. Trimester One will comprise the Italian module and Trimester 2 the French Module. There will be two 1-hour lectures per week. In the second half of the Trimester one of the hours will be assigned to tutorials on the set songs with an accompanist available.

For each language studied:

- 1. Portfolio of 2-4 short written and recorded exercises on course content. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (15%)*
- 2. One written test. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (35%)*
- 3. Presentation and performance in class of a song. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3. (15%)*
- 4. Individual oral test including the declamation and performance of one song or aria. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3). (35%)*

Assessment details for this offering

For each module (Italian and French) you will have the assessments outlined in the table below. Each module will contribute 50% of the overall grade for the course.

Portfolio of written and recorded exercises:

Italian: 4 written or recorded exercises

Assigned in Wednesday class and due the following Wednesday.

Due on the following dates: 23rd March, 6th April, 8th April, 13th May

French: 4 written or recorded exercises

Assigned in Wednesday class and due the following Wednesday.

Due on the following dates: 17th August, 16th September, 19th September, 5th October

The oral tests and the written tests will be held in the final week of each trimester (in the week of 30th May for Italian and in the week of 10th October for French). The oral tests will be by individual appointment either within class time or at an agreed time outside of class in the same week.

For the individual oral tests and for the presentation and performance of a song in class, a schedule of individual times will be made available at least two weeks in advance.
