Course delivery

This course is taught via a seminar format in which the lecturer assists in explaining Latin grammar, vocabulary and translation; students participate fully in all activities such as explanation and learning, as well as reading and translating sentences and passages.

Communication of additional information

Changes and information will be announced in class; via Classics notice boards in Old Kirk level 5, opposite OK 504 and 505; or by email. Final examination timetables will be made available to students by the FHSS and Victoria University. It is the student's responsibility to obtain such information and respond appropriately.

Course prescription

A study of Latin, assuming basic reading skills, with emphasis on the reading of selected texts.

Learning objectives

Moving on from LATI 103, this is an elementary course designed to give students who wish to continue with Latin the necessary level of competence to take LATI 213. LATI 104 aims to develop students' knowledge of Latin grammar and syntax and, more importantly, to develop students' reading competency. Students who successfully complete LATI 104 will have a sound understanding of Latin morphology and grammar and the main syntactical constructions; will have read unadapted passages of classical Latin; and, with the aid of a dictionary, will be able to read more straightforward passages of Latin authors.

Assessment

LATI 104 is 100% internally assessed. The assessments allow both student and lecturer to evaluate the student's progress in accomplishing the objectives of the course. In addition to providing a final grade, assessments evaluate progress in three key areas:

- memorisation of vocabulary and grammatical points.
- understanding of how vocabulary and grammar are used, tested by the translation of simple sentences of Latin to English or English to Latin.
- application of students' knowledge by translating passages from Latin to English.

Five 25-minute quizzes covering material from the *Oxford Latin Course* (as in the proposed outline below). Each quiz will be worth 15% and <u>only your best four marks will be counted</u> for a total of 60%. These quizzes reinforce recent grammar and vocabulary learned on a regular basis, though some revision of other material may be necessary.

FINAL TEST: 40%

Friday 14 October 2011

This 50-minute test will be a comprehensive assessment of everything learned in the course.

Penalties

All in-term tests must be taken on the day set, unless there are medical or other demonstrable extenuating circumstances. Variances will be considered upon application—preferably before the event.

Workload

Students are recommended to spend a minumum, on average, of 12–14 hours per week on this course, allowing for a higher workload in the week leading up to a quiz or test, and allowing also for revision in the mid-trimester break.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements. It is highly unlikely, however, that any student will complete the course satisfactorily without attending and fully participating in at least 80% of all classes and attempting all work set.
