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Keyboard Labs

Keyboard Labs commence in the second week of the trimester. Groups will be posted on Blackboard and/or on the noticeboard outside the office on the NZSM Kelburn Campus at the start of Week 2.

PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introduction to fundamental written skills in music, and to basic forms used in Western Music, including introduction to the keyboard, and practice in aural perception. Preference will be given to students majoring in Music.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

This course will consist of two 1-hour interactive lectures for Theory, one 1-hour interactive lecture for Aural, and one 1-hour Laboratory per week for Musicianship (Keyboard and Aural). It will be structured around a range of learning activities, including small group work, and whole class discussions. The Lab will normally provide time to discuss issues relevant to assessed work and provide feedback.
