Teaching learning summary

This course is delivered through three lectures, one tutorial and one audiovisual class per week. The lectures will mainly cover grammatical aspects of the Italian language necessary for the development of reading comprehension and basic oral/written expression, as well as supporting oral/aural skills through an increasing use of Italian in class. Tutorials are designed to support the development of oral expression skills and AV classes to improve students' listening comprehension. Students are required to participate actively and practice their developing language skills in lectures, tutorials and AV classes.

Communication of additional information

The Italian noticeboard is in the corridor outside rooms vZ503 and vZ504. Additional information or information on changes will be conveyed to students either via class, noticeboards, Blackboard, or email.

Course prescription

This is not a course for beginners, but for students who have completed ITAL 114 or who can demonstrate an equivalent knowledge of Italian. The course builds on the skills developed in ITAL 114, with greater emphasis on written and oral expression. Materials used in class provide further insights into Italian life.

Learning objectives

The course is designed to enable students to reach a level of language proficiency consistent with level A2 (elementary) of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, which allows for international recognition of language qualifications.

Upon completing the course successfully students should be able to:

- i. understand and reproduce in both written and spoken Italian a variety of grammatical structures using a basic vocabulary;
- ii. express themselves in Italian, both orally and in writing, on their activities and interests, as well as on a range of situations connected with daily life;
- iii. read basic Italian with relative ease;
- iv. write simple Italian from dictation;
- v. read aloud simple passages with correct pronunciation, fluency and reasonable speed.

The written tests and the assignments relate to objectives (i), (ii) and (iii).

The listening comprehension tests relate to objectives (i), (ii) and (iv).

The individual oral test and the communicative/oral assessment relate to objectives (i), (ii), (iii) and (v).

Expected workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 100-level, one trimester, 20-point course should work on average 13 hours per week, including the 5 contact hours – i.e., in the case of ITAL115, 8 hours of private study outside class time.

After week two of the trimester all undergraduate textbooks and student notes will be sold from vicbooks on Level 4 of the Student Union Building.

Assessment requirements

Assessment for ITAL 115 is by in-term assessment, as follows:

- (i) 2 written tests (20% each)
- (ii) 2 assignments (10% each)
- (iii) 2 listening comprehension (AV) tests (10% each)
- (iv) 1 individual oral test (10%)
- (v) Communicative/oral assessment: based on tutorial tasks (5%) and preparation (online vocabulary quizzes) (5%).

The relevant dates for assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme.

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a *maximum of 5%* may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Mandatory course requirements

In order to complete ITAL 115, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- (i) attend a minimum of 80% of the audio-visual classes (AV);
- (ii) prepare for (including completion of online quizzes) and attend a minimum of <u>80%</u> of the oral classes (tutorials);
- (iii) submit the 2 written assignments by the date indicated;
- (iv) sit the 2 written tests on the dates indicated;

- (v) sit the individual oral test at the appointed time; and
- (vi) sit the 2 listening comprehension (AV) tests at the appointed times.

Presentation of assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossingsout indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4centimetre margin and write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

All assignments must include a coversheet available from the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz (vZ610). Assignments are to be handed into the Italian assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office area (vZ610). Corrected work will be handed out in class. If you do not collect your work in class, you will be able to collect it from the SLC Office (vZ610). All work not collected will be destroyed three months after the date of the final written test.

Class representative

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students. Class representatives will attend a meeting with the Head of School to discuss how your courses are going and to raise any concerns or suggestions that they may have.

Second Life Romance Languages Pilot Project

Interested students can apply to be part of the Second Life Romance Languages Pilot Project. A pilot group of students from French 216, Italian 115 and Spanish 216 (max 5 students each) will supplement their regular in-class language study and prepare for their oral presentations using Second Life resources. They will meet with their tutors (trained by Edith Paillat from the Language Learning Centre [LLC]) once a week for an extra one hour per group (over and above their usual class times) in the LLC to learn how to use the basic tools and software, and to be guided through the virtual worlds relevant to their languages in order to foster engaging interactive learning. Edith and the tutors will also introduce students to the key online operatives for Paris, Turin/Venice and Barcelona/Mexico/Machu Picchu (the virtual cities which replicate Real Life cities) and will assist the students "in world".

By the end of the course, the students involved will have acquired:

- a sense of belonging to an international community of language-users
- a greater contextual understanding of the cultural and social dimensions of languagelearning and an ability to relate their language learning to their own specific interests and experiences

- resources that enable them to extend their language-learning and cultural experience beyond the framework provided by the course itself (training students in self-learning, one of the goals of the BA)
- technological expertise related to virtual worlds
