Tutorials start in the second week of the trimester. Students must choose oral and audiovisual class groups by signing up using the S-cubed system. <u>https://signups.victoria.ac.nz</u>. You remain in your allotted group for the whole course, unless a change is authorised by the Course Coordinator.

Course delivery

Lectures include reading, writing, speaking and listening practice as well as the study of grammatical structures and kanji. Tutorials include speaking and writing of the language as well as other in-class activities. Students are expected to engage proactively in using Blackboard, including the completion of 7 online quizzes via Blackboard.

Communication of additional information

Any additional information relating to this course may be found on the Japanese notice board situated on the 7th floor of the von Zedlitz Building and Blackboard. You are advised to check Blackboard and the notice board regularly.

Course prescription

This course is designed for students who have completed JAPA 116 or JAPA 104 and who wish to advance in Japanese language study with extensive practice of all four language skills. By the end of this course students will understand 625-700 kanji.

Course content

This course is designed for students who have completed beginners' level Japanese with approximately 300 hours of class work and knowledge of 500 kanji (JAPA 104/JAPA 116 or its

equivalent). It focuses on further developing students' communication ability in Japanese at the intermediate level. The course schedule can be found on the last page of the course outline.

Learning objectives

- 1. Students will develop their language ability to low intermediate level where they will be able to converse fluently and express their opinions about matters of a general nature, both orally and in writing.
- 2. Students will learn about Japanese society and its people through language study, so they will have a more profound understanding of Japan and are able to communicate with Japanese people on various topics.
- 3. By the end of the course, students should be familiar with approximately 625-700 kanji, approximately equivalent to Japanese Language Proficiency Test Level N3.

Expected workload

Students must submit all assignments, sit all tests and quizzes, and play a drama at tutorials, as well as attend at least 80% of all lectures and tutorials.

General Guide to Workload

- a. Students are required to attend 3 hours of lectures and 2 hours of tutorial per week.
- b. The University guideline for the average number of study hours per week including class contact hours for a 20 point course is 13 hours per week. This means that students on average are expected to devote 8 hours per week to memorization of kanji, online quizzes, class preparation and revision, assignments and preparation for tests.
- c. If your progress is not satisfactory despite spending a large amount of time on study, you should consult the Course Coordinator. The consultation time of the Coordinator will be posted on the notice board outside vZ711.

This test is an aural comprehension test based on the topics, vocabulary and grammar studied throughout the course.

Penalties

- a) If you are unable to sit a test due to unforseen reasons, you must contact the lecturer prior to the test and if there is a medical reason, you must provide a medical certificate.
- b) For students who are unable to sit a test due to exceptional circumstances such as heath problems or a family bereavement, alternative arrangements may be agreed to by the Course Coordinator, on presentation of a medical certificate or other appropriate document(s). Such arrangements must be made as soon as possible, at the latest the day after the test date. If the Course Coordinator has not been contacted by that day, a fail grade may be awarded".
- c) If you are unable to submit your assignment by the due date, you must contact the lecturer before that date and if there is a medical reason, you must provide a medical certificate. The deadline for an assignment will be notified in the assignment paper or in class.
- d) If you fail to submit your assignment by the due date without giving prior warning, the mark of this assignment will be nil.

Mandatory course requirements

To gain a pass in this course each student must:

- a) Attend at least 80% of all lectures and tutorials.
- b) Sit all major tests (10%+).
- c) Submit all assignments by their due dates.

Class representative

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class.
