PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Advanced study of diction and language for singers selected from the following range: English, Italian, French, German. May include an introduction to another language as available.

COURSE CONTENT & DELIVERY

This course comprises 2 hours of classes per week, some of which will be taken as masterclass style tutorials.

The course will be in 4 sections (A-D):

A Italian

Trimester 1, week of 30th April to week of 4th June (Margaret Medlyn, Jenny Wollerman) **C Russian**

Trimester 2, week of 16 July to week of 20th August (Dr Irina Elgort, Margaret Medlyn) D German

Trimester 2, week of 10th September to week of 15th October (Lisa Harper Brown, Richard Greager)

READINGS, MATERIALS & EQUIPMENT

Students will be expected to use their handbooks and dictionaries from PERF1-236 for French, Italian and German. Dictionaries and texts required for Russian will be announced prior to the course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will be able to:

1. demonstrate knowledge at an advanced level of the principles of text analysis and singing diction in the languages previously studied;

2. acquire enough knowledge of an ancillary foreign language to be able to declaim and sing selected song texts with accuracy and understanding.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

Approved assessment regime

There are 2 items of assessment:

1. Individual oral exams for each of the languages studied, including declamation and performance of one song or aria, on the dates below (divided equally between the languages). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (50%)

2. In-class work and portfolios of weekly homework assignments for each of the languages studied (divided equally between the languages). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (50%)

Assessment details for this offering

This paper is internally assessed.

Individual oral exams for each of French, Russian, German and Italian including declamation and performance of one song or aria, on the dates below (each module worth 12.5%)

In class work and portfolios of weekly homework assignments for each of French, Russian, German and Italian (each module worth 12.5%)

A schedule of individual times will be made available at least two weeks in advance of the oral exams.

Students who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for the essay, must apply to the paper coordinator <u>before</u> the due date. Please note that NO extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

Assignments must be submitted by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, assessment submitted after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

ASSIGNMENT PRESENTATION

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 15-point full-year paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time).
