# **COURSE PRESCRIPTION**

This course explores a variety of approaches to theatre directing through practical workshops and theoretical study of directing methodologies. The emphasis is on leading a creative process from conception to performance through collaboration with actors, designers and technicians. Each student will direct a short play for public performance.

# **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

Students passing the course should be able to manage all aspects of directing a play text including choosing the play, casting, building a team of design and technical collaborators, planning and running rehearsals, working with actors and designers, directing technical and dress rehearsals. Students will also develop an awareness of wider theatre production and management processes through undertaking a collaborative project in a production or publicity role. Students will also be able to analyse and articulate selected key methodologies and historical movements in theatre directing, based on individual study and research. By the end of the course the students will have developed an advanced understanding of all aspects of theatrical production and increased their knowledge of the history and practice of theatre directing.

#### **EXPECTED WORKLOAD**

The University anticipates that you should be able to devote at least 10 hours per week to a full-year (two trimester) paper in a 4-paper Honours or Graduate programme. At Honours level, it is expected that students will attend every seminar; if you expect to be absent from a class seminar, please contact the course co-ordinator in advance if possible.
