Teaching/learning summary

There are three lectures per week. This course has no tutorials but students are expected to keep up with the reading and preparation work for classes.

Course prescription

The selected 19th and 20th century texts are studied in their socio-historical and literary context. The course aims to develop students' ability to write about these texts in a critical, informed and persuasive manner.

Course content

This course focuses on three 19th and 20th century French writers of poetry and fiction. It begins with a study of Prévert's poems from *Paroles*. This is followed with a study of Baudelaire *Fleurs du mal* and finishes with Guy de Maupassant's short stories from *Une Nuit – Clair de lune*.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the course students should be familiar with the set texts and be able to discuss them in their appropriate socio-historical and literary contexts.

Expected workload

The University Assessment Handbook recommends that students devote 13 hours per week on average to a course of this level and duration. Attendance to class (3 lectures per week), preparation for class, revision of class material and autonomous work is expected (about 10 hours per week).

Assessment requirements

The tests (at the end of each module) are designed to assess students' abilities to discuss in detail, through analysis and interpretation, the set text. The assignment (essay) allows students to further analyse one of the set texts.

Students must include a cover sheet available from the SLC Office and place their works **on the due date, and no later than 4 pm**, in the French assignment box located to the left of the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz. Students may also be asked to provide a Word copy.

Penalties

Failure to complete any of the 3 tests and to hand in the assignment is failing the course requirements.

Late assignments may be accepted but will be assigned a zero mark if no prior arrangement is made. A replacement test will be organised only if prior arrangement has been made or if a medical certificate is produced. Requests should be addressed to the appropriate lecturer as early as possible before the deadline or, if not foreseeable, on the same day the work is scheduled.

Mandatory course requirements

Students must complete all the work (3 tests and 1 assignment) in time and attend at least 80% of classes.

Class representative

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students. Class reps will attend a meeting with the Head of School to discuss how your courses are going and to raise any concerns or suggestions that they may have. Turnitin will retain a copy of submitted material on behalf of the University for detection of future plagiarism, but access to the full text of submissions is not made available to any other party.
