Teaching/learning summary

This course is delivered through one one-hour lecture and one one-hour tutorial per week. These are delivered together in a two-hour session in which a range of materials will be covered. Class activities will include comprehension, conversation, AV exercises, translation and reading exercises. Students are expected to participate actively in class.

Course prescription

Advanced-level study of both written and spoken Italian.

Learning objectives

The course aims to further develop your skills in writing, reading, comprehension and oral expression through an indepth study of the structures of language, using a wide variety of authentic texts and materials.

Aims

- 1. to extend students' ability to comprehend a wide variety of written and spoken Italian;
- 2. to help students work on advanced sentence structure and usage in essay writing;
- 3. to provide students with the opportunity to develop advanced translation skills from Italian into English and vice versa;
- 4. to give students the opportunity to express themselves critically and analytically in Italian about various aspects of contemporary Italian society and culture.

Objectives

Upon completing the course successfully students should be able to:

- i. express themselves fluently and correctly in different registers in both oral and written Italian;
- ii. understand and use complex sentence structures in both written and spoken Italian;
- iii. translate confidently texts which require advanced language skills from and into Italian;
- iv. express themselves critically on a wide variety of topics in written Italian.

Expected workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a full year, 30-point course should work on average 10 hours per week, including the 2 contact hours—i.e., in the case of ITAL401, 8 hours of private study outside class time.

Readings

There are no set texts for this course. The lecturers will provide most of the materials for the course at the start of each teaching unit or via Blackboard; photocopying costs will be advised. Extensive use will be made of up-to-date materials from Italian newspapers, magazines, television, websites and a variety of other sources. Students will also be encouraged to find and suggest other authentic materials for use in class. Assessment requirements

ITAL401 is entirely internally assessed, as follows:

- i. 4 written assignments of up to 1,000 words each (5% each);
- ii. 4 1 hour written tests (10% each);
- iii. 2 30-50 minute oral/aural tasks (5% each);
- iv. 2 20-30 minute oral presentations (5% each)

v. Weekly online or journal written communication task of at least 250 words each (20%).

The relevant dates for assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme.

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Mandatory course requirements

In order to complete ITAL 401, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- i. submit the four written assignments by the due dates;
- ii. sit the four written tests on the dates indicated;
- iii. do the oral/aural tasks on the dates indicated;
- iv. deliver the oral presentations on dates agreed with the lecturers;
- v. complete the weekly written communication exercises;
- vi. attend at least 80% of lectures/seminars.

Class Representative

A class representative will be elected in the first class, and that person's name and contact details will be available to VUWSA, the Course Coordinator and the class. The class representative provides a communication channel to liaise with the Course Coordinator on behalf of students. Class representatives will attend a meeting with the Head of School to discuss how your courses are going and to raise any concerns or suggestions that they may have. Presentation of assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4-centimetre margin and double space or write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil. All assignments must include a cover sheet either supplied or available from the SLC Office, von Zedlitz (VZ) 610. Assignments are to be handed in to the Italian assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office. Corrected work will be handed out in class. If you do not collect work in class, you will be able to collect it from the SLC Office. All work not collected will be destroyed 3 months after the date of the final written test.
