## **COURSE PRESCRIPTION**

This course initially introduces students to the history, theories, genres, and culture of news media; thereafter, it considers contemporary news texts and practices in terms of the contexts of globalisation, changes to the cultural field of journalism/media, and the advent of digital technologies.

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

Students passing the course should be able to demonstrate:

- 1. A knowledge of the history of news culture within the wider context of the advent of communication and the culture industry.
- 2. Literacies regarding the logics, imperatives and discourses that characterize the field of news journalism.
- 3. An understanding of the public sphere roles of journalism and news culture.
- 4. An understanding of the transformation, in the digital age, of news culture, and its practices and genres.
- 5. Enhanced literacies in textual and contextual analysis.
- 6. Enhanced literacies regarding the field of the media.

#### **EXPECTED WORKLOAD**

The expected workload for a 20 point course is 200 hours over the trimester or 13 hours per teaching week.
