PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Development of jazz combo ensemble playing techniques, interaction, knowledge of standard jazz repertoire, and self-directed rehearsal techniques; development of skills for large jazz ensemble including the reading of charts and sectional playing or singing.

TEACHING LEARNING SUMMARY

Combo and Repertoire Combo cover ensemble playing skills, including soloing, leading, and comping. Big Band covers sightreading and large jazz ensemble skills.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 15-point full-year paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 5 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will:

1. Demonstrate competency in ensemble performance on their chosen instruments, including an awareness of both group dynamics and rhythm

2. Demonstrate knowledge of the role(s) of their instruments, and awareness of the roles of other instruments, in a combo, big band or jazz choir.

3. Show awareness of and competency in standard performance techniques from a range of jazz styles and periods.

4. Demonstrate the ability to memorise specified tunes, and to apply skills learned in Jazz Improvisation to an improvisation on those tunes in a group context.

5. Demonstrate increasing skills in the sight reading of specified charts.

3. Big Band/Jazz Choir Rhythm Workshop and Sightreading assessment 1 and 2. Related to learning outcomes 2 and 5. (30%)

PENALTIES

Assignments must be submitted by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, assessment submitted after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

Each student must:

a) Complete and pass the assessment specified for this course, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late completion of work).

b) Attend at least 80% of combo, repertoire combo, and big band or jazz choir rehearsals.

c) Organise a substitute player for every absence from combo, repertoire combo or big band. If a substitute is not organised, 5% will be deducted from the final year's mark for each absence which is not covered.

If for health reasons you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes for this paper by 16 November, you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director, NZSM.
