PAPER PRESCRIPTION

An introductory study of diction and language for singers selected from the following range: English diction, Italian, French and German.

TEACHING LEARNING SUMMARY

This course comprises two 50-minute classes per week, some of which will be given as lectures and some as tutorials, as defined in the course syllabus accompanying this outline. During each tutorial, students will perform their chosen works in a masterclass-style session, with the staff member giving guidance and feedback, giving the opportunity for all students to learn from this instruction, both through listening and performing in these masterclass sessions. A schedule of assigned tutorial dates showing when each student will be expected to perform will be made available at the beginning of each trimester.

In 2013 the languages studied will be Italian and French.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

A 10-point full-year paper should require at least 100 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 3 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Students who successfully complete this paper should be able to demonstrate knowledge of 1. the principles of text analysis, singing diction and the application of IPA (International Phonetic Alphabet) to indicate pronunciation in the languages studied

2. essential musical terminology in the foreign language(s) studied

3. enough basic grammar to be able, with the aid of a dictionary and/or given translations, to grasp the basic structures and meanings of song texts in the foreign language(s) studied to be able to declaim and sing selected song texts with clear and accurate pronunciation

1. Portfolio of 2-4 short written and recorded exercises on course content. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (15%)

2. One written test. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (35%)

3. Presentation and performance in class of a song. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3. (15%)

4. Individual oral test including the declamation and performance of one song or aria. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3). (35%)
