Prescription

This course will examine anthropological approaches to select issues in cognitive and psychological Anthropology. It will focus on how culture and experience relate to each other.

Course content

Most of the material that we will be exploring ordinarily falls within the purview of psychological anthropology. However, ANTH 208 is not an introduction to psychological anthropology per se. Rather, the objective of the course is to expand your thinking about the range of phenomena relevant to the anthropological study of society and culture.

Topics covered in the course include:

- Various perspectives on the links between psychology and culture
- Cognition
- Dreaming
- Emotion
- Culturally bound syndromes
- Cultural "complexes" (e.g. revenge, honour)

The course will concentrate on anthropological literature and studies but will also consider work in other disciplines when appropriate

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students passing this course should be able to:

- 1. focus on the recent thinking about the interrelationships between society, culture and experience
- 2. be aware of the above connections and

3. consider these within the discipline of social and cultural anthropology

Teaching format

Information will be delivered to students in lectures, readings, and tutorials. In order to benefit from the lectures and tutorials is essential to the readings on time. There is a list of readings by week in the course notes. The tutorials are mainly for you to ask any questions about the material from meetings or lectures, to meet and discuss these issues with other students, and to prepare your outline and essay.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- complete the essay outline
- complete the essay
- complete take home test

Workload

In line with the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences guidelines you should devote 13 hours per week to this course; this includes 2 lecture hours and 1 hour of tutorial time. The other 10 hours will be made up by reading and essay preparation and writing.

Assessment

This course will be internally assessed. There will be one research essay, one tutorial report and one take home test. Further information about the assessments will be handed out in class and posted on Blackboard.
