Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Describe and critically evaluate different methodological approaches used in criminological research
- 2. Critically evaluate the nature of criminal justice statistics
- 3. Describe the important social and ethical issues relating to research in criminology
- 4. Employ quantitative and qualitative research methods to investigate criminological phenomena

Teaching format

This course comprises twelve 2 hour lectures and nine 1 hour tutorials.

Attendance as tutorials is mandatory. In order to meet the mandatory requirements for this course you must attend at least 7 out of 9 tutorials.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit Assignments 1, 2, & 3
- 2. Submit the research proposal
- 3. Sit the final exam
- 4. Attend at least 7 out of 9 tutorials

Workload

The total student work load for the course will be approximately 200 hours. This includes:

- Attendance at lectures and tutorials: 33 hours
- Reading, work on assignments, exam study: 167 hours

Submission and return of work
