PRESCRIPTION

The English novel from its beginnings to 1930, with special attention to a selection of major works. The lectures discuss the novel's general historical development, special areas of interest, and individual authors and works; tutorials give practice in the critical study of the form and text of major novels.

COURSE CONTENT

The course covers the classic English novel from Jane Austen to D.H. Lawrence, with special attention to eight novels. You have the opportunity to make somewhat broader studies of Jane Austen and E.M. Forster if you wish. You are required to study all these texts, each of which is the subject of at least three lectures and one tutorial session.

General Notes:

- a) A novel course inevitably involves a considerable amount of reading. You are therefore urged always to keep well ahead with your reading. Though tutors are aware of the pressure of work, you should always aim to have read each novel before the designated tutorials.
- b) The texts themselves are your highest priority. Critical reading is valuable, but should be secondary. Abridged texts are not acceptable; make sure you have the correct/prescribed version of *Lady Chatterley's Lover* as there are three different versions of this text. Texts must be brought to the tutorials.
- c) Book supplies are sometimes problematic. All books should be bought or ordered early in the trimester.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the texts
- 2. Provide insightful, literary analysis of the texts, and shape that analysis into a coherent discussion
- 3. Provide 'close readings' of selected passages, and contextualise those readings within the wider ideas and style of the relevant novel
- 4. Compare the ideas and style of one novel with another

TEACHING FORMAT

This course is delivered through lectures (three per week) and tutorials (you attend one per week). While brief lecture notes will be added to Blackboard over the course of the trimester, you should not assume that reading those notes will be a complete replacement for what we cover in a lecture.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Submit the essays on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work)
- Sit the examination
- Attend 8 tutorials

WORKLOAD

The expected workload for a 20 point course is 200 hours over the trimester or 13 hours per teaching week, including lectures, tutorials, and non-contact reading, research and writing. However, novels require

substantial reading time, and you may need to devote more time to the pleasure of reading than in some other courses.

The two essays are designed to develop your skills of close discussion of the detail of texts and your skills of discussion and argument on a larger scale. You will write one essay on a single text, and another essay that compares selected passages from two texts. You will not be able to write on the same text twice in the course work, but you will be able to write on these texts again in the exam.

You are encouraged to submit essays early, especially if this helps you to avoid conflict with the demands of assessment in other courses.

Text books may not be taken into the end-of-year examination.

SUBMISSION AND RETURN OF WORK

You are required to submit both a hard copy and an electronic copy of your essays by the due date.

Work provided for assessment in this course will be checked for academic integrity by Turnitin. Follow the instructions provided in the "Assignments and Turnitin" section of Blackboard.

Hard-copy assignments are submitted in the drop slot outside the administration office: von Zedlitz level 8. Attach an assignment cover sheet or extension form, found on Blackboard or outside the administration office. Remember to fill in your tutor's name.

Your marked assignment will be handed back by your tutor in tutorials or during their office hours. Any uncollected assignments can be picked up from the Programme Administrator after the last day of teaching. Assignments will be held in the Administration office until the end of the following trimester. You need to show your student identification to collect marked assignment from the Administration office.

PENALTIES

Work submitted after the deadline will be penalised by a 2.5 percent deduction from your total mark per work day. Late work also receives only minimal comments from your marker.

In exceptional and unforeseen circumstances an extension may be granted. Issues of workload do not constitute exceptional and unforeseen circumstances. If you require an extension, you must complete an
