PRESCRIPTION

A study of the cinema of a selected country or countries from cultural, historical, and economic perspectives. In 2013, the course will focus on Classical Hollywood Cinema from the 1920s to the 1960s. It will explore topics such as the studio system, the coming of sound, classical Hollywood style, censorship, genre, and stardom.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. Explain economic, aesthetic and technological developments from the Classical Hollywood era.
- 2. Demonstrate familiarity with and understanding of key critical concepts used to analyse Classical Hollywood Cinema, and apply these concepts to relevant films where appropriate.
- 3. Explain the relationship between Classical Hollywood films and selected economic, aesthetic, technical, social, cultural, or political developments.
- 4. Demonstrate scholarly research and writing skills.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course will involve one screening, one lecture and one tutorial per week (in that order). Your lecturer and tutors will put maximum effort into teaching at a high level. In return, you are asked to actively engage in the course. That involves attending all lectures and tutorials, reading the required texts on a weekly basis, actively searching for more information about topics which interest you, preparing questions for tutorials, engaging in discussions in tutorials, and performing at your best in assignments.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Submit all written assignments on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work)
- Attend and participate in at least eight (8) tutorials

WORKLOAD

This is a 20 point course, so the University expects you to devote 200 hours to it: across 15 weeks (12

teaching weeks + 2 weeks mid-term break + 1 study week) that equates to an average of 13-14 hours per
