Prescription

A development of the skills taught in GERM 217, and an advanced study of the subjunctive mood. Special emphasis will be given to the active use of German in both written and spoken form.

Course Content

GERM 218 is a second trimester course of four hours per week, involving two lectures, one language tutorial and an audio-visual class. The course presupposes a pass in GERM 217. Students who have completed GERM 217 and 218 may proceed to GERM 315, GERM 316, GERM 320 and GERM 321.

GERM 218 is based on a varied approach. The four language classes are devoted to the development of different but complementary skills and aim to enable students to consolidate the language skills they have already acquired. The two lectures concentrate on revision of the most significant grammar points, the tutorial concentrates on the development of reading and aural-oral comprehension and practises strategies for language learning and language use. The audio-visual class is devoted chiefly to the fostering of aural and oral skills by means of discussion texts on a variety of themes as well as a variety of print media, computer programmes and visual media. The course content will cover such topics as "Beziehungen", "Rund ums Produkt", "Märchen" and "Zukunftspläne".

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass the course should

- 1. have a good grasp of basic German grammar
- 2. have a good knowledge of German vocabulary pertaining to a number of different word fields
- 3. have an understanding of different styles of German
- 4. be able to conduct a relatively fluent conversation in German on a variety of topics

Teaching format

The formal lectures act as a platform to impart to students the most significant grammar points covered in 218, and include explanations of the subjunctive mood. Although these are lectures, students are encouraged to ask questions. The tutorial accentuates the development of reading and aural-oral comprehension. Students are expected to participate actively in the tutorial, as well as in the audio-visual class.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, the minimum course requirements which must be satisfied in order to pass the course are: attendance at a **minimum of 80**% of classes in **each** of the **four sections** of the course, and attendance at the two written tests, submission of written assignments by due date, and attendance at the oral test, as stipulated on p. 4. Unless notified to the contrary, students may assume they have met the mandatory course requirements.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 200-level one trimester 20-point course should work on average 13 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of GERM 218, 9 hours of private study outside class time. This will naturally vary according to the knowledge of German with which the student comes to the course.

Assessment

GERM 218 is internally assessed.

1. Tests

The two language tests are designed to assess the student's familiarity with the material studied prior to the test, in all four classes, ie Lectures, Tutorials and AV Classes. They may contain grammar and vocabulary exercises, reading comprehension and basic writing tasks.

2. Assignments

In addition to the two language tests, students have to complete five assignments. Assignments 1, 2 & 3 will be based on themes and material covered in class. The set tasks may include grammar exercises, reading comprehension, translation or short written compositions. Assignments 4 & 5 are short weekly tasks and are designed to help students to spread their study evenly throughout the course. Assignment 4 is based on reading short stories from the set text of this course *Die Blaumacherin* and answering weekly comprehension questions on Blackboard. Assignment 5 consists of weekly vocabulary quizzes based on vocabulary lists provided by the tutors. (See Assessment requirements above.)

3. Oral Test

This is 10 minutes in length. Students will prepare a little speech on a topic supplied by the tutors. They will then be asked questions in German. The test is designed to test the student's fluency, grammatical correctness and use of vocabulary in oral German.

Submission and return of work

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines or double space if typing. Do not write in pencil.

All assignments must include a cover sheet provided or available from the SLC main office. Assignments are to be handed in to the German assignment slot located to the left of the SLC main office area on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz. Marked work will either be returned in class or be made available for collection from the SLC main office. Please bring your student ID card with you when you come to collect your work.

Penalties

a) The Tests

Attendance at the two language tests is essential. Failure to attend a test will automatically result in failing the course. If a student is prevented from attending through exceptional circumstances such as accident, illness or bereavement, an explanation *must* be made, if

possible in writing, *prior to the test*. In this case an alternative test date may be arranged. (NB: In case of illness, a medical certificate is required.)

b) The Assignments

Failure to hand in an assignment results in a zero mark for that assignment. It is up to students unable to attend a particular class for any reason to find out from someone else what the homework is and the date it is to be submitted by. In special circumstances such as illness or bereavement, an extension may be granted, but only after consultation with the teaching staff concerned.

Students may use dictionaries and grammars to complete the assignments, but since these count towards the final grade (30%), no other help is permissible. Please take careful note of the University's statement on "Academic Integrity and Plagiarism".
