Course prescription

A continuation of the work done in GERM 315 in all four language skills, again exploiting a variety of oral and written exercises, and making particular use of authentic contemporary materials in both aural and printed form. Language studied is based on the topics "places" and "media".

Course content

The course aims to provide students with the resources and guidance needed to improve their communicative competence in German, to enhance their knowledge of German grammar and vocabulary, and to increase their familiarity with various aspects of life in German-speaking countries. Classroom activities will be based on analysis and elaboration of a range of authentic material, taken mainly from the textbook, and will allow students to practise reading, writing, speaking and listening to German, as well as combining these skills for effective communication in realistic contexts. The material for this course will be taken primarily from chapters 3 (*Orte*) and 8 (*Medien*) of *Em neu 2008 Hauptkurs B2*. Students will be expected to participate actively in all classes and, especially in the tutorial groups, to contribute to class discussion. Importance will also be placed on developing independent learning habits that will allow students to continue to improve their German beyond the scope of this course.

Course learning objectives

GERM 316 presupposes a pass in GERM 218, and assumes that the student is already familiar with the fundamentals of German grammar and has a good basic vocabulary. The course is designed not as a systematic and consecutive study of grammatical rules, but rather as a means of consolidating and extending what has already been learnt. Students who pass the course should be able to:

- 1. follow complex lines of spoken or written argument on a familiar topic,
- 2. recognise and manipulate linguistic structures appropriate to the level B2 in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages,
- 3. speak with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes interaction with native speakers possible, and
- 4. present clear, detailed descriptions on a wide range of subjects in both spoken and written form.

Teaching format

GERM 316 is a second trimester course of four hours per week, involving three lectures and one tutorial.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50% students must:

- (i) sit the written tests on the dates indicated;
- (ii) complete the written assignments by the due dates;
- (iii) sit the oral test ;
- (iv) attend a minimum of 80% of lectures and tutorials.

Unless notified to the contrary, students may assume they have met the mandatory course requirements.

Workload

In addition to the four class hours, nine additional hours per week. Students are expected to use this time for revision, extra practice (e.g. using the *Arbeitsbuch*), skill development (e.g. in the LLC, with a language buddy or a book!), preparing and completing the assignments and reading tasks, and preparing for the written tests and the oral exam. Although the study time required to perform successfully in this course will vary according to the student's prior knowledge of German, please note that all language students benefit from maximum contact with the target language.

Assessment requirements

1. Written Tests

The two tests are designed to assess the student's familiarity with the material studied and their ability to understand and manipulate the relevant language effectively and accurately. Each test may include reading, comprehension, grammar and vocabulary exercises, as well as questions aimed at testing relevant cultural knowledge.

Attendance at the two tests is essential. Failure to attend a test will automatically result in failing the course. If a student is prevented from attending through exceptional circumstances such as accident, illness or bereavement, an explanation must be made, if possible in writing, prior to the test. In this case an alternative test date may be arranged. (NB: In case of illness, a medical certificate is required.)

Each test will presuppose acquaintance with the material studied prior to that test in the Lectures and Tutorials.

2. Compulsory Assignments

The assignments are designed to give students the opportunity to practise and make creative use of their writing, listening and speaking skills, to reinforce, extend and apply their knowledge of grammar and vocabulary, and to personalise and extend their interaction with the German-speaking world beyond the classroom environment.

Dictionaries, grammars and other relevant reference materials may be used in completing written assignments, but since these count towards the final grade (14%), students must otherwise complete them unaided. Any sign that this is not so will be investigated. Please take careful note of the University's statement on "Academic Integrity and Plagiarism".

Students are invited to submit draft copies of written assignments. Drafts will be accepted up to one week before the due date of each assignment. These will not be marked or graded, but will be returned to students with feedback on how they may improve their work before final submission. Marking criteria are available on Blackboard.

For assignments 2 and 3, students are expected to work with others in their tutorial group in teams of 2 - 5. A single mark will be given for the work of the whole team. Together, these two assignments add up to 15% of the total assessment for the course.

3. Reading Tasks

The reading tasks are designed to give students the opportunity to practice and develop their reading skills, to reinforce, extend and apply their knowledge of grammar and vocabulary, and to increase their familiarity with life and culture in the German-speaking world via regular exposure to authentic short texts dealing with issues relating to the topics covered in the course.

Each week from week 3 to week 9 and once during the mid-trimester break, students will be required to read a particular text from the *GERM 316 Leseheft* and answer the questions about it that will be posted on Blackboard.

4. Oral Test

This is 15 minutes in length, and students will be asked to present one text selected at random from the *GERM 316 Leseheft* and to give their own views on its subject matter. They will then be asked questions in German. The test is designed to test the student's familiarity with the

course material, as well as fluency, grammatical correctness and use of vocabulary in oral German.

Submission and return of work

All final copies of written assignments must be submitted before 4pm on the due date **in two forms:** firstly, an electronic copy is to be uploaded to the relevant assignment drop box on the GERM 316 Blackboard website; and secondly, a print-out is to be handed in to the German assignment box located to the left of the SLC Reception area on Level 6 of von Zedlitz. The print-out must include a cover sheet available from SLC Reception or Blackboard. Assignments will not be considered complete until submitted in both forms. Assignments submitted after the due date will incur a 5% penalty for each day of lateness. Marked work will either be returned in class or be made available for collection from the SLC main office. Please bring your student ID card with you when you come to collect your work.

Penalties

The due dates for the assignment must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after 25 October.

Em neu 2008 Hauptkurs B2

Students must possess both the *Kursbuch* and the *Arbeitsbuch* and unless otherwise instructed should bring them to all four weekly classes. *GERM 316 Leseheft* is also available from Vic Books. This contains texts for the reading assignment tasks. Students are not required to bring it to class.

<u>Aufgabenstellungen</u>

Eine Kurzgeschichte schreiben (individuelle Aufgabe; 7% der Gesamtnote) Verfassen Sie eine Kurzgeschichte (250 – 350 Wörter – nicht länger!) zum Thema "Märchen". Das Thema können Sie so behandeln, wie Sie wollen. Beim Schreiben denken Sie aber daran, dass Ihre Geschichte eventuell als Basis für ein Theaterstück (Länge etwa 10-15 Minuten) dienen wird!

2. Ein Theaterstück schreiben (Gruppenaufgabe; 7% der Gesamtnote)

Bilden Sie mit anderen Kursteilnehmern eine kleinere Gruppe von 2 – 5 Studenten. Lesen
Sie die Kurzgeschichten der anderen Gruppenmitglieder und wählen Sie zusammen EINE
Geschichte aus, die Sie alle als Basis für ein Theaterstück geeignet finden. Machen Sie aus
der Geschichte ein Theaterstück, indem Sie gemeinsam die Dialoge zwischen den
Charakteren ausarbeiten und kurze Szene- und Handlungsbeschreibungen hinzufügen.
Dabei können Sie gerne eventuelle Verbesserungen vorschlagen, und soweit Ihre
Gruppenkollegen einverstanden sind, kann die Geschichte in dieser Phase noch geändert
werden. Wichtig ist, dass Sie sich in der Gruppe auf EINE Endfassung des Theaterstücks

3. Das Theaterstück aufführen (Gruppenaufgabe; 8% der Gesamtnote)

Setzen Sie sich mit Ihren Gruppenkollegen zusammen und planen Sie die Aufführung des Theaterstücks. Verteilen Sie erstmal die Rollen: Wer ist Regisseur? Wer spielt welchen Charakter? Welche Requisiten und Kostüme brauchen Sie? Wollen Sie auch Musik haben? Üben Sie die Aussprache der Dialoge und lernen Sie Ihren Text auswendig! Achten Sie dabei nicht nur auf die Aussprache einzelner Laute oder Wörter, sondern auch auf die Betonung und Sprachmelodie (Intonation) innerhalb ganzer Wortgruppen und Sätze. Außerdem ist es wichtig auszudrücken, ob der Sprecher wütend, traurig, glücklich, gelangweilt, schüchtern, "gut drauf" usw ist.

Vereinbaren Sie mit Monika einen Termin für die Aufführung Ihres Theaterstücks! Dafür stehen Ihnen die letzten drei Tutorial-Sitzungen (in den Wochen 9 – 11) zur Verfügung. Viel Glück und viel Spa β !
