Prescription

This course examines key developments in early modern history that helped to shape the modern world.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass HIST 235 should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate their understanding of subject material via clear and concise prose;
- 2. Critique historiographical debates concerning early modern history;
- 3. Interpret primary and secondary sources and integrate historical research into structured essays;
- 4. Differentiate major themes in early modern history from the mid-thirteenth century to the mid-seventeenth century.

Teaching format

HIST 235 is taught in two 50-minute lectures per week and one 50-minute tutorial per week. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Complete the three assessment items specified for HIST 235, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as stated for late submission of work);
- 2. Attend at least 8 of 10 tutorials convened from Week 2 to Week 11.

Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. This includes weekly attendance at lectures and tutorials, completion of all set weekly readings and research and writing for set assessment tasks.

Marking criteria

Marking criteria for the three assessments will be placed on Blackboard well in advance of the assessment dates.

Submission and return of work

Essays should be submitted through the History Office essay drop-off point, Old Kirk 405, together with completed cover sheet, available on Blackboard and/or from the office (OK405).

Essays and tests will be returned at times to be advised. If students fail to attend these times, they may collect their essay from the Office, Room 405, Old Kirk Building between the hours of 1.30 and 2.30 pm from Monday to Friday and must show their Student ID card before collection.

Penalties

Students will be penalised for late submission of assignments – a deduction of 5% for the first weekday late, and 2% per weekday thereafter, up to a maximum of 10 weekdays. Work that is more than 10 weekdays late can be accepted for mandatory course requirements but may not be marked. Penalties may be waived if there are valid grounds (for example, illness [presentation of a medical certificate will be necessary] or similar other contingencies). In such cases, students should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.
