# **Prescription**

This course explores the history and practice of New Zealand's international relations. Topics covered include regional issues in Asia and the Pacific, trade and security policy, multilateralism and the UN, cultural and public diplomacy, and the role of non-governmental actors. There will be guest speakers from MFAT and other agencies. 60% internal assessment, 40% examination.

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1 Illustrate understanding of the key issues and actors in New Zealand's international relations
- 2 Apply concepts and theories from the wider IR literature to explain developments in New Zealand's international relations
- 3 Critique the strengths and weaknesses of the existing scholarship on New Zealand's international relations.
- 4 Explain the history and practice of New Zealand's international relations from a range of analytical perspectives

# **Teaching format**

This course is taught in weekly three-hour seminars over 12 weeks. Students are expected to attend seminars regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

# **Mandatory course requirements**

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit both research essays
- 2. Sit the final examination

### Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. This includes weekly attendance at lectures, completion of all set weekly readings and research and writing for set assessment tasks.

#### Assessment

There are three pieces of assessment for the course: two research essays essay and a final examination.

1. Essay Assignment One (30%) The purpose of the assignment is for you to give an analysis of the key issues from the first part of the course, including debates about the history of New Zealand's international relations. The essay must not be more than 3,500 words (excluding bibliography and footnotes). It must be submitted in hardcopy as well as in electronic format by the deadline. Extensions will be granted for serious reasons only (in the case of illness, a medical certificate is required). The essay is due by 5pm on Friday 23 August. More information about the essay will be distributed in class and posted on Blackboard.

- 2. Essay Assignment Two (30%) The purpose of the assignment is to test understanding of the key issues from the second part of the course, including key relationships in New Zealand's international relations. The essay must not be more than 3,500 words (excluding bibliography and footnotes). It must be submitted in hardcopy as well as in electronic format by the deadline. Extensions will be granted for serious reasons only (in the case of illness, a medical certificate is required). The essay is due by 5pm on Friday 18 October.
- **3. Final examination (40%).** The purpose of the exam is to test students' overall grasp of the issues, readings and debates covered in the class. The examination is two hours long. The date will be confirmed once the examination timetable is announced during the trimester.

#### Submission and return of work

All written work must be submitted in hard copy in the course essay box outside the School office on the fifth floor of the Murphy building. All assignments must have a Programme cover sheet attached.

The Programme's policy requires that students also submit an **electronic copy** along with the hardcopy. For this course, please upload a copy to Turnitin.com on the same due date for your hardcopy submission. Instructions for how to register and upload to Turnitin will be distributed in class.

Essays and tests will be returned at times to be advised. If students fail to attend these times, they may collect their essay from the School Office, Murphy 518 between the hours of 2.00 and 3.00 pm from Monday to Friday.

# **Penalties**

Students will be penalised for late submission of assignments — a deduction of 5% for the first day late, and 2% per day thereafter, up to a maximum of 8 days. Work that is more than 10 weekdays late can be accepted for mandatory course requirements but may not be marked. Penalties may be waived if there are valid grounds (for example, illness [presentation of a medical certificate will be necessary] or similar other contingencies). In all such cases, prior information will be necessary.

The set text is the course notes for INTP 451: *New Zealand Diplomacy* (2013), available from VicBooks. Additional and recommended readings will be posted on E-Reserve in the Library or on Blackboard.
